Definition of Key Terms

Extract from Local Authority Youth Service Operational Planning 2004-05 Good Practice Guidance

The following tables set out a continuum of possible involvement by young people in youth work provision.

What: Gateways to youth work, access, making contact, developing and maintaining relationships with the invitation to move along the spectrum of youth work involvement
Numbers: 25% of 13-19 year olds
Definitional Term: Contact
Examples: occasional attendance at a youth club, known to detached worker by name and sight, turn up from time to time at a youth work event, issue based session with a group within school. Not school assemblies.

What: range of time spent and frequency but taking up what is on 'offer' or, in other words, participating in the youth work curriculum in some way **Numbers:** 15% of 13-19 year olds

Definitional Term: Participant

Examples: active participation in a concentrated experience or at regular intervals over a period of time within an annual period.

What: Credit for achievements – informal, within a structure but possible for short activities or events e.g. making a presentation at a conference or reaching an objective in your personal programme such as anger management. This would be delivered by the workers known to the young person.

Numbers: 60% of participants

Definitional Term: Recorded outcome

What: Accredited outcomes

Numbers: 30% of participants

Definitional Term: Accredited outcome

Examples: Gloucestershire Award – a local scheme; Youthtrain – developed and delivered locally but nationally accredited by OCN at NVQ level equivalents, AQA – a national scheme which accredits units developed locally; Youth Achievement Award, Getting Connected, Duke of Edinburgh Award etc.

Youth Service Targets for 2007-2008

These targets are defined by the National benchmarks outlined in the Credit Where It Is Due Paper to which all Local Authority Youth Services are expected to work toward and attain. For RBWM these correlate to the following target numbers based on the most recent census data available, that of 2000.

For the purposes of working out our Service targets the 13 – 19 resident population Census Data 2000 is 11,427.

Attached at the end of this paper are the RBWM Wards and population data, which relates to specific areas within the Borough and has a direct bearing on each team locality. The WAT Team encompasses the Southern Parishes with work in the Northern Parishes primarily attributed to work carried out within scope and remit of the OEP. Though there is scope for other project teams such as the SIT and MAT to contribute to and carry out work within these areas.

The following targets are based on what is required to meet the set bench marks and apportioned on an equitable level taking into account staffing, resources and facilities. It should also be noted that there will need to be high level of inter team work agreements and partnership agreements with both internal and external agencies and organisations to attain these targets.

The most important targets we need to achieve in both the National Benchmarks and the Best Value Performance Indicators (BVPIs) are the recorded and accredited outcomes. These are the prime targets we are measured against and it should be considered that when the contact and participation targets are exceeded the recorded and accredited outcome targets subsequently increase by the same percentage. Therefore as the quantity increases the expectation of the quality also increases. These targets also reflect the fact that some young people may contribute to the overall targets on more than one occasion or project and once taken into consideration will reduce down to the set targets.

Youth workers are the only staff who need to record this information all partnership work and achievements will count towards attaining the overall service targets. Work carried out jointly with other youth workers should be agreed with prior consent as to who will attribute them to their work or how they will be shared.

The achievement of the targets is a not a competitive exercise but a foundation on which we practice and deliver the work. Therefore working together and more cohesively will provide a more inclusive and universal service to young people.
