- 2.1. There are four main Partnership Boards the Local Safeguarding Children Board (LSCB), Health and Wellbeing Board, Children and Young People's Partnership Strategic Board and the Adult Safeguarding Partnership Board in the Borough whose objective impact on children, young people and their families. The draft protocol, attached at Appendix 1, seeks to clarify the roles of each of the Boards and how they work together to achieve better outcomes for children and young people in the local area.

Protocol Agreement setting out the relationship between Windsor & Maidenhead Local Safeguarding Children Board (LSCB), Safeguarding Adults Partnership Board (SAPB), the Health and Wellbeing Board (H&WB) and Children & Young People's Partnership (CYPP)

1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1. This document sets out the expectations of the relationship and working arrangements between Windsor and Maidenhead's Local Safeguarding Children Board (LSCB), the Safeguarding Adults Partnership Board (SAPB), the Health and Wellbeing Board (H&WB) and the Children & Young People's Partnership Strategic Board (CYPP). It covers their respective functions and arrangements to secure effective co-ordination and coherence between the Boards in order to achieve better outcomes for children and young people.
- 1.2. The four Boards have formally agreed to the arrangements set out in this document which takes into account relevant national guidance and legislative requirements.

2 STATUTORY FRAMEWORK FOR THIS PROTOCOL

- 2.1 The statutory framework within which this protocol operates is:
 - Section 10, 11, 13 and 14 of the Children Act 2004
 - Local Safeguarding Children Board Regulations 2006/2010
 - Working Together to Safeguard Children 2013
 - Health and Social Care Act 2012
 - Apprenticeship, Skills, Children and Learning (ASCL) Act 2009
 - Care Act 2014

3 SHARED PRINCIPLES

- 3.1 The Boards have agreed these shared principles:
 - The Boards share a commitment to a strategic approach to understanding needs of, and improving outcomes for, children, families, and adults. Actions to achieve this will include analysis of data and effective engagement with frontline practitioners, with children and young people and their families.
 - The Boards will work together to minimise the duplication of reports and actions and to ensure that there are no unhelpful strategic or operational gaps in policies, protocols, services or practice.
 - The Partnerships are committed to developing a joined up approach to understanding the effectiveness of current services and identifying priorities for change, including where services need to be improved, reshaped or developed.
 - All four Boards will work together to provide constructive challenge to one another and partners.

4 SHARED DELIVERY

4.1 It is acknowledged that the Boards will have similar priorities for children and young people and in the course of their work, each Board is likely to contribute to the

identification and delivery of priorities from each other's strategies and work plans. All four Boards are committed to ensure that their respective responsibilities and work are fully understood and informed. The inter-connectedness of senior representation on all four Boards ensures that issues are addressed in the most appropriate place.

- The Independent Chair of the LSCB and SAPB is a co-opted member of the Health and Wellbeing Board and the Children and Young People's Partnership Strategic Board.
- The Director of Children's Services is a member of the LSCB, the H&WB and Children and Young People's Partnership Strategic Board.
- The Director of Adults and Community Services is a member of the SAPB and the Health and Wellbeing Board and is represented by the Head of Public Health on the CYPP.
- 4.2 In formulating the Health and Wellbeing Strategy and priorities, the Health and Wellbeing Board will take specific steps to ensure that they have taken account of the need to secure the safety and well-being of children and young people at risk of abuse or neglect and of vulnerable adults. It will do this by:
 - Considering the annual reports of the LSCB and SAPB as items on its agenda.
 - Seeking the views of the LSCB and SAPB in drawing up its H&WB strategy and priorities.
- 4.3 The LSCB and SAPB will take account of the work and priorities of the H&WBB by:
 - Considering the Health & Wellbeing Strategy and priorities at meetings of the Boards.
 - Determining how actions to support the Strategy can be included within the annual business plans.
 - Taking an active part in consultations that the Health and Wellbeing Board may undertake to inform its strategic priorities.
- 4.4 The Children and Young People's Partnership will formally consult the LSCB, SAPB and Health and Wellbeing Board on the development and revision of its Outcomes Framework and ensure that the priorities within it reflect the actions within those business plans.
- 4.5 Any particular issues or concerns raised by one Board for consideration by any of the other Boards will be scheduled onto the next appropriate agenda for consideration.
