1. SUMMARY

- 1.1.1 Eton Dorney Rowing Lake is designated as the venue for the rowing and flat water canoeing Olympic and Paralympic events in 2012. Whilst the Royal Borough is not the official host authority, as the site is geographically located in South Bucks District Council, the event will have a significant impact upon the Royal Borough with the majority of the public access to the Olympic events, being via Windsor Racecourse.
- 1.1.2 The Royal Borough therefore has a significant role to play in off-site support during Games time. In addition, there will be a real opportunity for the local economy, particularly the visitor economy, including shops and restaurants, with the large number of rowing enthusiasts from home and abroad, who will want to experience the Games at Eton Dorney. The back drop of Windsor Castle and local heritage will also undoubtedly give an international press focus as part of the worldwide press coverage of the Games. All these things present pressures and opportunities for the Borough and its businesses and residents.
- 1.1.3 The role that the Council has adopted to date therefore is to liaise directly with appropriate authorities, ie., Olympic Delivery Authority (ODA) and London Organising Committee of the Olympic & Paralympic Games (LOCOG) to support their development and preparations for the Games. This has been particularly the case in the area of transport and transport planning. At the same time, the Council has facilitated opportunities for businesses, both to be able to bid for particular contracts through the Compete 4 programme and worked closely with the Visitor Management Sector for advance preparations in the lead up to and post Games. This report sets out some of the key successes in each of those areas.
- 1.1.4 However, with now just under two years to go to the Games, the Officer Programme Board has taken the opportunity to review the Council's strategy and the revised version is enclosed for comment and endorsement. The report also highlights the areas where the Council might want to focus its activity and support during the period of the next two years.

2. **RECOMMENDATION**

That :

- i) the content of the report be noted and the priority work for the next two years be endorsed
- ii) the revised strategy be endorsed
- iii) the revised Governance arrangements be endorsed

What will be different for residents as a result of this decision?

The revised Strategy will give clarity of roles and responsibilities for all in the support for delivery of a successful 2012 Olympic & Paralympic Games with opportunities for residents and businesses to benefit and deliver a positive legacy for the Royal Borough.

3. SUPPORTING INFORMATION

3.1 Background

- 3.1.1 The Council has worked closely with its neighbours and partner organisations and in 2008 developed a strategy for the Eton Dorney corridor in support of preparations and delivery of the Olympic Games at Eton Dorney Rowing Lake. There have been considerable achievements since and these are summarised below:-
 - Transport
 - Support for the ODA in the development of their Venue Transport Plan
 - Close working relationship with the ODA for the development of their Olympic and Paralympic Route Network which highlights key routes for access for the Games Family
 - Agreement for Maidenhead Station to become one of the rail hubs for events at Eton Dorney
 - Working closely with the ODA to develop Park & Ride in Ascot and Maidenhead to support the Games
 - Working closely with ODA and Windsor Racecourse in respect of all aspects of Windsor Racecourse becoming the transport hub and main access to the Eton Dorney site for spectators and visitors to the Games
 - Achievement of £5 million pounds for the capital maintenance and improvement works to Windsor & Eton Relief Road to be completed in time for the Games
 - Achievement of £5 million pounds of funding from SEERA for the Windsor Parking and Transport Strategy which will again be in place in time for the Games as well as supporting the local economy in Windsor and the surrounding area. The Clarence Road Roundabout forms part of this funding stream and is now included as part of the Windsor & Eton Relief Road project for project

implementation purposes.

- Support for Businesses and the Local Economy
 - Access audit undertaken supported by grant funding to review accessibility arrangements in the surrounding area, required to highlight improvements needed to support competitors and visitors to the Games, whether to the Olympics themselves or to the Paralympics
 - **Skills Audit**
 - Welcome Host Programme
 - Presentations to the Chambers of Commerce and local businesses to highlight the opportunities available to them to compete for contracts through the Compete 4 Programme.
- **Engagement of Young People**
 - 34 schools signed up to the London 2012 Get Set Programme
 - £75K of grant funding achieved for the Adizone project
 - Ongoing financial annual support (£6K per year for 4 years) for sports and arts bursaries from the Louis Baylis (Maidenhead Advertiser) Charitable Trust.
 - Achieved over £70K of grant funding to increase participation in sport and physical activity for young people and families.
- Volunteering •
 - As well as national promotion, being promoted by the Windsor Visitor Centre website with a link to the WMVA website.
 - All libraries have publicity about the 'Games Maker' volunteer recruitment programme (www.london2012.com/get-involved/volunteer) and staff are aware of how to register in order to assist those residents who wish to volunteer but do not have access to the Internet at home or at work.
- Cultural Olympiad •
 - The Cultural Olympiad runs from 2008-2012 and RBWM has been involved in a number of activities not least of which was the lighting event in Alexandra Gardens/Eton Bridge.
 - Windsor Festival is working with partners to develop a project involving schools & young people including dance, LED illuminated sculptural trees powered by renewable energy and outdoor performance in Windsor & at Dorney Lake in the summer of 2012.
 - Firestation Centre for Arts and Culture planning a 'Games Walk' Sculpture Trail along the bridges & other riverside structures between Windsor/Eton and

Dorney Lake, funding is currently being sought

- Participation in ongoing events and projects: Discovering Places, Open Weekend, Peoples Record, including installation this year of 'The Prize' by Steve Yeates at Maidenhead Library. Purchased using S106 funding for public art, the sculpture has 300 years of British successful invention, ranging from the anemometer to the world wide web, printed on the body of a striving athlete made from recycled paper over a steel skeleton & suspended in front of a Union Flag
- Planning has started for photographic competition involving local communities being jointly by Maidenhead Camera Club & Windsor Photographic Society working with Norden Farm & Firestation
- The recent successful bid to Heritage Lottery Fund for a development grant of just under £25K to work up the second phase of the Museum at the Guildhall includes the development of a programme of community case displays and could include an Olympics related theme
- The Berkshire Record Office, funded in part by the RBWM, is engaged in a programme of active collection and interpretation of sports club records leading to an exhibition in 2012 of longstanding sporting achievement in the County.
- Partnership Arrangements
 - The Council has been working with a wide range of partners and had engaged at national and local level to achieve the optimum outcomes for local residents and local businesses. These include:-
 - Membership of the South East Partnership where much of the co-ordination is undertaken.
 - Establishment of sector groups which support the visitor economy, local . businesses and others.
 - Regular meetings with key representatives from ODA and LOCOG
 - Ongoing dialogue with neighbouring authorities on any areas of mutual interest
 - Establishment of a major events group which brings together all of the key players, such as Ascot Racecourse, Windsor Racecourse, Legoland, Windsor Castle etc., so that we can manage all of the major events that take place within the Royal Borough and, where possible avoid conflict.
 - Utilities Conference
 - Under the lead of Councillor Colin Rayner, Lead Member for Highways & Streetcare, regular meetings take place with key representatives from the utilities companies to highlight the need for better co-ordination of their works and minimise disruption to residents and road users alike. The Games has given a clear focus

for this area of work.

- Meetings with the Chambers of Commerce and Other Business Representatives
- 3.1.2 All of the above is co-ordinated by the Officer Programme Board and reported through to Lead Member, Councillor Simon Dudley, Deputy Leader and Lead Member for Adult and Community Services. A corporate risk assessment has also been undertaken which forms part of the Council's Corporate Risk Register and is updated with the Lead Member on a regular basis. As can be seen from the above, much has already been achieved but with just under two years to go, we now need to review and agree our focus of activities for our support for a successful Games, against the backdrop of the new national agendas of the Big Society, public sector spending etc.

3.1.3 Next Steps

3.1.4 Review of Governance Arrangements

Whilst the governance arrangements described above have worked well, it is suggested that new arrangements be put in place to address the new focus of activities as follows:

- Informal Member Working Group comprising:
 - Cllr Simon Dudley Lead Member & Deputy Leader
 - Cllr Colin Rayner Lead Member for Highways & Streetcare
 - Cllr Mrs Christine Bateson Lead Member for Community Partnerships & Consultation
 - Cllr Mrs Eileen Quick Lead Member for Children's Services
 - Cllr Mrs Cynthia Endacott Representing West Windsor Residents Local Ward Member

These Members are suggested due to their particular Lead Member roles and expertise.

- Terms of Reference (tbc) but the group to meet on a bi-monthly basis or at such times to meet the work programme and receive reports from the leads for each work stream. The group could also invite presentations from local business groups, resident groups, ODA / LOCOG, major event holders, cultural groups, schools etc or co-opt representations from such organisation as appropriate.
- The role of the group will be :
 - i. To facilitate local residents, business and other groups to maximise the local potential and benefits from the Games in the lead up to, during Games time and as a real legacy from the Games.

- ii. To support ODA / LOCOG in their preparations for and delivery of the Games, particularly through delivery of its local authority functions eg., licensing, environmental health, highways, car parking enforcement, street cleaning etc..
- iii. To support and facilitate Torch Relay activities should the Royal Borough be chosen as part of the Torch Relay route.
- iv. For the avoidance of doubt the Council's role is one of support and facilitating and is not an organiser of the Games.

• Programme Board – the Group will be supported by the Officer Programme Board.

3.1.5 <u>Strategy for the London 2012 Games</u>

3.1.6 In the light of the above and with the clear focus required for the next two years, against a backdrop of financial constraint, officers have taken the opportunity to review the strategy and ensure that it meets both Member and resident requirements as a clear focus for work over the next two years. This document is included as Appendix 1.

3.1.7 Summary of Key Areas of Focus / Activity

- The Economy & Support for Local Business it is expected that the local Chambers of Commerce and local business take the lead on this.
- Cultural Olympiad & Cultural Legacy to be led by local arts centres and arts groups.
- Sport & Young People jointly led by RBWM, schools & sports partnerships
- Residents & Opportunities for Volunteering Lead WMVA
- Transport Support for ODA RBWM & Bucks CC
- Torch Relay (if confirmed) tbc
- Local Authority service delivery support in conjunction with South Bucks DC, Bucks CC, LOCOG and ODA.
- Communications

4.2 Risk assessment

4.2.1 Finance and Funding – The funding for the Games and venue infrastructure is in place but the call on additional local support from the surrounding local authorities is being assessed. This will be subject to further report as no specific budget has been set aside to support the Olympic preparations/activities.

This will include a review of the Councils own infrastructure such as roads, car parks, parks and open spaces etc to ensure that they are fit for purpose.

At the time of writing this report a planning application for the onsite infrastructure and temporary bridge had not been received.

- 4.2.3 Support to / from Businesses A meeting has taken place with the President of the Maidenhead and District Chamber of Commerce and another is to take place with the President of Windsor. The expectation via the Strategy is that local businesses, Chambers of Commerce, Town Partnership etc will take ownership and responsibility for the coordination of business activity.
- 4.2.4 Expectations from Residents this will be subject to further report.
- 4.2.5 Press and Local Communications the Strategy sets out proposals for local volunteering, cultural Olympiad all aimed at engaging with and supporting local residents.

5. CONSULTATIONS CARRIED OUT

5.1.1 There has been extensive discussion with ODA/LOCOG on issues relating to the Eton Dorney venue which directly affect the Royal Borough. These will continue through the local planning groups.

5.1.2 The Olympic Route Network's transport plans have been subject to consultation and available on the ODA website. A planning application is expected for infrastructure improvements and temporary bridge. A local exhibition took place in September and will be subject to further consultation through the planning application process.

Foreword

Maximising opportunities Minimising disruption



We are absolutely delighted that the rowing and canoeing events for the 2012 London Olympic and Paralympic Games are to be held at Eton Dorney's world class venue. I know the Royal Borough's usual warm welcome will be extended to the thousands of competitors and spectators expected for this exciting sporting spectacular.

To have the Olympics and Paralympics right on our doorstep is not only a thrilling prospect but also a challenge. However, when it comes to the 'Big Occasion' the Royal Borough is up there with the best. Helping with the organisation of royal events, state visits and crowdpullers like Royal Ascot and the Windsor Tattoo is part of the council's normal working life.

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Setting the scene

The London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games have particular significance for the Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead, with the rowing and canoe sprint events to be held at the Eton College Rowing Centre at Dorney Lake.

The Olympic competitions will run from 28 July to 11 August and the Paralympic events from 31 August to 2 September.

At that stage the eyes of the world will be on this venue at the eastern edge of the Royal Borough. More than 30,000 spectators are expected to attend every day, and up to 30,000 media representatives. That's why it is vital for the Royal Borough to plan ahead for such a high profile global event to maximise the benefits for our community and do everything we can to minimise disruption.

Eton Dorney venue location



The location of Dorney Rowing Lake right on the borders of a number of local authority areas means the Games will impact not only on the Royal Borough but also on Buckinghamshire County Council, South Bucks District Council and Slough Borough Council. For this reason we have been working with them and other partners through the Dorney Corridor Strategy Working Group to ensure plans are co-ordinated and effective across borders.

Within the working group, sectoral groups have been set up to mirror those of the regional South East Partnership (SEP) for the London 2012 Games to ensure continuity of reporting and focused output.

There are currently six Dorney Lake 2012 sectoral groups:

- Sports
- Visitor Economy
- Transport
- Culture

- Skills and Training
- Business and Inward Investment

There are also three areas that have cross sector significance: Volunteering, Sport & Young People and Communications & Media.

Robust links have also been established with the Olympic Delivery Authority and LOCOG (the London Organising Committee of the Olympic and Paralympic Games) which is responsible for preparing and staging the Games. This means that the Royal Borough has been directly involved in the planning processes, particularly having a voice in transport planning and arrangements.

While not the host authority – the site is in the South Bucks District Council area – the Royal Borough will have an important role to play in off-site support during the Games. The events at Dorney Lake will have significant local impacts, many of them with the potential to be of tremendous benefit to current and future generations of residents, particularly young people.

There will also be significant impact on the local economy, particularly the visitor economy, as the huge numbers of Games visitors (competitors, officials and spectators) take advantage of the opportunity to experience the wider attractions of the Royal Borough during their stay.

This strategy, while recognising the vital cross-boundary co-operation needed to explore and exploit the Olympic potential across the Dorney Corridor, underlines how the Royal Borough will work to:

Maximise opportunities and minimise disruption for our residents, businesses and visitors.

The following sections reflect the strategic planning for the 2012 Olympics in the Dorney Corridor. They demonstrate the Royal Borough's partnership approach to maximising the positive impacts of the Games on our local community and minimising potential disruption.



Transport

We will work with our partners to deliver high quality, accessible and sustainable transport to the Eton Dorney venue and local visitor destinations, whilst minimising travel disruption for our residents, businesses and non-Games visitors.
