## Agenda Item 3

#### MEMBERS' GUIDE TO DECLARING INTERESTS IN MEETINGS

#### **Disclosure at Meetings**

If a Member has not disclosed an interest in their Register of Interests, they **must make** the declaration of interest at the beginning of the meeting, or as soon as they are aware that they have a DPI or Prejudicial Interest. If a Member has already disclosed the interest in their Register of Interests they are still required to disclose this in the meeting if it relates to the matter being discussed.

A member with a DPI or Prejudicial Interest may make representations at the start of the item but must not take part in discussion or vote at a meeting. The term 'discussion' means a discussion by the members of meeting. In order to avoid any accusations of taking part in the discussion or vote, Members should move to the public area or leave the room once they have made any representations. If the interest declared has not been entered on to a Members' Register of Interests, they must notify the Monitoring Officer in writing within the next 28 days following the meeting.

#### Disclosable Pecuniary Interests (DPIs) (relating to the Member or their partner) include:

- Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain.
- Any payment or provision of any other financial benefit made in respect of any expenses occurred in carrying out member duties or election expenses.
- Any contract under which goods and services are to be provided/works to be executed which has not been fully discharged.
- Any beneficial interest in land within the area of the relevant authority.
- Any licence to occupy land in the area of the relevant authority for a month or longer.
- Any tenancy where the landlord is the relevant authority, and the tenant is a body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest.
- Any beneficial interest in securities of a body where:
  - a) that body has a piece of business or land in the area of the relevant authority, and
  - b) either (i) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body  $\underline{or}$  (ii) the total nominal value of the shares of any one class belonging to the relevant person exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

Any Member who is unsure if their interest falls within any of the above legal definitions should seek advice from the Monitoring Officer in advance of the meeting.

A Member with a DPI should state in the meeting: 'I declare a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest in item x because xxx. As soon as we come to that item, I will leave the room/ move to the public area for the entire duration of the discussion and not take part in the vote.'

Or, if making representations on the item: 'I declare a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest in item x because xxx. As soon as we come to that item, I will make representations, then I will leave the room/ move to the public area for the entire duration of the discussion and not take part in the vote.'

#### **Prejudicial Interests**

Any interest which a reasonable, fair minded and informed member of the public would reasonably believe is so significant that it harms or impairs the Member's ability to judge the public interest in the item, i.e. a Member's decision making is influenced by their interest so that they are not able to impartially consider relevant issues.

A Member with a Prejudicial interest should state in the meeting: 'I declare a Prejudicial Interest in item x because xxx. As soon as we come to that item, I will leave the room/ move to the public area for the entire duration of the discussion and not take part in the vote.'

Or, if making representations in the item: 'I declare a Prejudicial Interest in item x because xxx. As soon as we come to that item, I will make representations, then I will leave the room/ move to the public area for the entire duration of the discussion and not take part in the vote.'

#### **Personal interests**

Any other connection or association which a member of the public may reasonably think may influence a Member when making a decision on council matters.

Members with a Personal Interest should state at the meeting: 'I wish to declare a Personal Interest in item x because xxx'. As this is a Personal Interest only, I will take part in the discussion and vote on the matter.

## CONSIDERATION OF APPLICATION FOR A NEW PREMISES LICENCE UNDER THE LICENSING ACT 2003

LICENSING PANEL SUB COMMITTEE: 15th May 2017

#### A) The Application

Applicant: - Corona Realty Ltd.

Premises: - Crown Inn, High Street, Bray, Berkshire, SL6 2AH.

The application relates to an application for a variation of the issued premises licence.

A summary of the application is as follows:-

• To vary the plans appended to the existing premises licence to include the garden area to include a bar servery and kitchen facilities.

With the following conditions proposed to promote the licensing objectives:-

- No sale of alcohol from the garden bar after 23.00hrs.
- There shall be no regulated entertainment or amplified music within the garden area.

No other changes sought, no further measures are considered by the applicant to be necessary.

The premises currently enjoy the following licensable activities and hours:-

Sale of alcohol (on and off)
Recorded music (indoors)

Monday to Sunday 11am to Midnight.

Monday to Sunday 11am to Midnight.

Monday to Sunday 11am to Midnight.

#### C) It is considered the following policies have a bearing upon the application.

#### **RBWM licensing policy:-**

#### 2.1 De-regulated Entertainment:-

The Legislative Reform (Entertainment Licensing) Order 2014 came into force on 6 April 2015 with the effect that the following forms of entertainment are no longer licensable –

- Performances of plays between 08.00 and 23.00 provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Performances of dance between 08.00 and 23.00, provided that the audience does not exceed 500
- 'Not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00, provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events between 08.00 and 23.00, provided that those present do not exceed 1000.

- Any contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Performances of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00, on any premises.
- Performances of amplified live music between 0800 and 2300:
  - On premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500
  - In a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500
  - In a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises
  - At the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital
- Playing of Recorded Music between 0800 and 2300:
  - On premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500

#### 9. Promoting the Prevention of Public Nuisance

Where relevant representations are made, the Licensing Authority will have particular regard to the following issues in relation to the public nuisance objective:

- The disposal of waste, particularly glass
- The use and maintenance of plant, including air extraction and ventilation systems
- Litter in the vicinity of the premises
- Noise from deliveries / collections to and from the premises
- Measures to control behaviour and queues
- Whether door supervisors are able to stay at the entrance to encourage quiet departure
- The provision of Hackney Carriage / Private Hire services at the premises
- Signs on doors and on tables encouraging consideration to the neighbours

#### Noise

Where relevant representations are made the Licensing Authority will impose conditions in relation to licensed premises to prevent unnecessary noise and disturbance to local residents where relevant representations are made. This may include restrictions on times when music or other licensable activities may take place and may impose technical restrictions on levels of sound at premises. Conditions may also be imposed requiring licensees to display signs at all exits from premises reminding customers to leave premises quietly and to respect the rights of nearby residents.

#### 6.2 Promoting food-led and seated entertainment venues

The Licensing Authority wishes to encourage applications for food-led and other predominantly seated entertainment venues. Nationally, it has been demonstrated that restaurants and similar establishments have a lower impact on crime, disorder and nuisance; this national observation has been experienced locally within the Royal Borough. In order to encourage food-led and other predominantly seated entertainment venues, the Royal Borough has determined to adopt a Framework Hours Policy with a terminal hour of 01:00 being set for such premises.

#### D) 182 National Guidance April 2017

#### Public nuisance

- 2.15 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.
- 2.16 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.
- 2.17 Conditions relating to noise nuisance will usually concern steps appropriate to control the levels of noise emanating from premises. This might be achieved by a simple measure such as ensuring that doors and windows are kept closed after a particular time, or persons are not permitted in garden areas of the premises after a

certain time. More sophisticated measures like the installation of acoustic curtains or rubber speaker mounts to mitigate sound escape from the premises may be appropriate. However, conditions in relation to live or recorded music may not be enforceable in circumstances where the entertainment activity itself is not licensable (see chapter 16). Any conditions appropriate to promote the prevention of public nuisance should be tailored to the type, nature and characteristics of the specific premises and its licensable activities. Licensing authorities should avoid inappropriate or disproportionate measures that could deter events that are valuable to the community, such as live music. Noise limiters, for example, are expensive to purchase and install and are likely to be a considerable burden for smaller venues.

- 2.18 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.
- 2.19 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the 10 | Revised Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.
- 2.21 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in antisocial behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.

#### D) Observations.

The Sub Committee is obliged to determine this application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives which are:

- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- Public safety;
- The prevention of public nuisance

• The protection of children from harm.

In making its decision, the Committee is also obliged to have regard to national guidance and the Council's own Licensing Policy. Of course, the Committee must have regard to all of the representations made and the evidence it hears.

The Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

- Grant the application as asked.
- Modify the conditions of the licence, by altering or omitting or adding to them.
- Reject the whole or part of the application.



    - ii. drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise)

- The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- Any individual employed to carryout a security activity must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority (SIA).
- Admission of children is restricted in accordance with the recommendation by the British Board of Film Classification. If
  the film has not been classified the restriction of children must be approved by the Licensing Authority. (Children means
  any person under 18 years).

### ANNEX 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

Environmental Protection has **no representation** to make regarding this premise licence variation application.

I visited The Crown on Friday 7 April.

The application is for a bar and barbecue area in the rear garden until 23:00. The applicant has offered the following conditions:

- There shall be no sales of alcohol from the garden bar after 23:00; and
- There shall be no regulated entertainment or amplified music within the garden area.

Environmental Protection has no record of complaints about the Beer Garden. I have seen that the Beer Garden is not overlooked and is some distance from the neighbouring properties. With the conditions offered I do not foresee problems such as noise nuisance.

The licensing regime does not consider the consumption of alcohol, such as in the Beer Garden, or the sale of food before 23:00.

As Wardens of Jesus Hospital we would strongly object to The Crown's application for variation of their premises licence to allow the garden to be used from 11am to 11pm for the following reasons.

We are extremely concerned for the health and welfare of our residents that live here in very close proximity to The Crown. Our nearest residents' almhouses being little more than 10 metres from their garden. We feel The Crown will spoil what has been nearly 400 years of peace and tranquillity at Jesus Hospital which is, and always has been, a relaxing and safe environment for elderly residents in their latter years if this Licence is granted.

Any noise created by activities in the garden would greatly impinge on our residents' quality of life which we experienced on Saturday last the 15th April. The Crown staged two events, two sessions of an Easter Egg Hunt with Disco using amplified music and microphone - 11.30am and 3pm. This, together with the screaming children and the adult on the microphone encouraging the children, meant that the noise level was completely unacceptable. We telephoned twice to ask them to turn it down and when this was not done we visited The Crown to ask them again as it was badly affecting several of our elderly residents. They did nothing.

There were 200-300 adults and children. A stage had been set up under a very large permanent/semi permanent event marquee with open sides covering most of the garden. There is also what looks like a permanent bar and servery.

We trust you will do the right thing and refuse this application.

As the joint Warden/Manager of Jesus Hospital, I represent the 18 residents who live here. Their average age is 81, with some being very much older. Jesus Hospital adjoins The Crown and the accommodation is in very close proximity to The Crown Garden and, as such, will be the most affected by outdoor events held there.

As most of the residents of Jesus Hospital are both elderly and vulnerable, they are greatly affected by excessive noise levels. I am concerned The Crown's planned outdoor events will feature loud music, and their application to use the garden to include an outside bar servery and kitchen facilities should be much more limited. It is not just the music that has to be considered, but the noise level generated by the increased amount of patrons attending events.

As representative, I wish to object to The Crown Public House seeking a licence to make their garden part of the licensed premises and provide outside bar servery and kitchen facilities from 11am to 11pm seven days a week which I believe is excessive.

Some of my residents are still reeling from a musical event that took place in the garden on September 20th, 2015 which many considered to be unbearably loud and adversely affected some of those whose homes are just the other side of the fence to the event, as well as other residents in the village of Bray. If The Crown is intending to have musical events in conjunction with BBQs etc, Jesus Hospital residents will be greatly affected.

There is a letter from the Crown management to our Chairman, following that event, stating that they have no intention of repeating a musical event such as the one that was so upsetting for my residents. I attach a copy of this dated 9<sup>th</sup> November 2015

The Crown staged another event this past weekend with music which I was assured would be "unamplified". Although the noise level this time was mostly acceptable, it was quite obviously amplified and could easily have been made much louder.

The fact that the Crown management have misled us on two occasions and appears to have ignored the assurances they previously made. My concern is there will be an increase in both the frequency and the volume of the many events which I am sure are planned for the future.

There is a very iconic painting of Jesus Hospital in the Tate Gallery which is titled "The Harbour of Refuge". It would be a tragedy if the peace and quiet of Jesus Hospital, which has existed for nearly four hundred years, and the welfare of the elderly residents was jeopardised.

These I believe are reasonable grounds for my objection.

## Re: The Crown at Bray: Application for Licence Extension

In responding to this Application to Extend the Licence at the Crown at Bray we have considered several topics.

- 1. The Crown is located next door to Jesus Hospital, a community of 18 homes for retired and elderly people. One wing of Jesus Hospital runs parallel to, and close to, the boundary fence with the garden of the Crown which is the subject of the extension. Noise from events held in the garden is a potential issue.
- 2. Easter Weekend just past saw a real problem of this type. Amplified entertainment and a large number of people in the garden of the Crown caused considerable disturbance and anxiety to the residents of Jesus Hospital. This must not be allowed to become a regular or even occasional situation.
- 3. There are some existing issues with noise disturbance to neighbours. Residents living across the road are still experiencing late night noise from taxis waiting on the front apron of the pub with their engines running. The Crown has been helpful in working with their preferred taxi company by asking them not to do this, however not all taxis collecting patrons of the Crown are ordered by the Crown and those from other companies continue to create noise in this way. Any extension which will attract more customers is likely to exacerbate this issue.
- 4. There are issues with cooking smells, particularly from cooking in the garden, being detectable at high concentrations at the other end of the village. Is there some way that this can be mitigated in the garden cooking area?
- 5. We are very pleased to note the statement in the Application that "there shall be no regulated entertainment or amplified music in the garden area". We strongly suggest that this becomes a condition of the licence but with the wording "there shall be no regulated entertainment, amplified music or amplified entertainment in the garden area".
- 6. The UK licencing laws are such that, once a licence has been granted it cannot be rescinded except if the licence has been breached and is taken by the local licencing authority to a panel review. The licence is also linked to the bricks and mortar and is transferred to anyone who owns or runs the premises in the future. Under these circumstances we believe that RBWM should be very careful about how wide the grant of any licence should be.

- 7. We understand that the Crown have been applying for TENs (temporary Event Notices) to cover special events in the garden. Any premises can apply for about twelve of these in a year. The Crown have not, to date, come close to applying for this number in any year. So is there a real need for such a wide ranging, blanket, licence?
- 8. We note that the Crown opens at 11.30hrs Monday to Friday and from 12.00hrs on Sunday. We wonder why there is a need for a licence starting at 11.00hrs on every day of the week.

Even with all of these considerations we are not against business in the Parish and would support some extension of the existing licence to facilitate this development.

Our belief is that the Application is too wide ranging in its original form at 11.00hrs to 23.00hrs and 7 days a week.

Our recommendation is that the extension should be allowed on Fridays and Saturdays from 11.30hrs to 23.00hrs and on Sundays and Bank Holidays from 12.00hrs to 21.00hrs with the condition that there will be no entertainment, amplified music or amplified entertainment in the garden area.

It has been brought to my attention that the Crown Inn, Bray has applied for a variation of its premises licence.

The application is for the following:-

To vary the plans to the existing premises licence so as to include the garden The garden will include a bar servery and kitchen facilities Monday to Sunday 11.00am to 23.00pm

We live in Nos. 3 and 4 Sunflower Cottages, High Street, Bray. Which are immediately in front of the Crown Inn. We have lived here for over 35 years, and the nuisance caused by the Crown is ever increasing. This latest application will only make things worse. Hence please accept this email as our <u>Objection</u> to the application.

The bedrooms of our property front directly onto the side access driveway into the Crown. We are currently disturbed at 5.00am to 6.00am by the service vans and lorries manoeuvring and delivering to the Crown. But the worst disturbance is caused by the taxis, very late at night. 23.00pm onwards, that pull up on the hard standing at the front of the Crown, either dropping people off and slamming doors. Or sitting there with engines running, loud voices and again doors slamming.

We realise that living in a village High Street will have some noise and activity, and that the Crown needs to be able to operate as a business. However a lot of the unnecessary disturbance and anti social behaviour generated by the Crown Inn could be prevented by a few simple measures:-

- 1. Do not allow this application to add further outside noise and disturbance to adjacent Residents.
- 2. Restrict delivery times to between 7.30am to 7.00pm
- 3. Force the Crown to erect bollards along the hard surface frontage, to prevent delivery vehicles/taxis from pulling up, engines running, door slamming etc. There is sufficient space at the rear car park for all vehicles to pick up and drop off safely and conveniently.

Similar restrictions were put on the adjacent Bray Village Hall, which made improvements.

I trust that this Objection will be considered and I look forward to hearing from you in due course.

The Trustees of Jesus Hospital would urge you to turn down this application to vary the existing licence.



As the joint Warden/Manager of Jesus Hospital, I represent the 18 residents who live here. Their average age is 81, with some being very much older. Jesus Hospital adjoins The Crown and the accommodation is in very close proximity to The Crown Garden and, as such, will be the most affected by outdoor events held there.

As most of the residents of Jesus Hospital are both elderly and vulnerable, they are greatly affected by excessive noise levels. I am concerned The Crown's planned outdoor events will feature loud music, and their application to use the garden to include an outside bar servery and kitchen facilities should be much more limited. It is not just the music that has to be considered, but the noise level generated by the increased amount of patrons attending events.

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Some of my residents are still reeling from a musical event that took place in the garden on September 20th, 2015 which many considered to be unbearably loud and adversely affected some of those whose homes are just the other side of the fence to the event, as well as other

The Crown staged another event this past weekend with music which I was assured would be "unamplified". Although the noise level this time was mostly acceptable, it was quite obviously amplified and could easily have been made much louder.

The fact that the Crown management have misled us on two occasions and appears to have ignored the assurances they previously made. My concern is there will be an increase in both the frequency and the volume of the many events which I am sure are planned for the future.

There is a very iconic painting of Jesus Hospital in the Tate Gallery which is titled "The Harbour of Refuge". It would be a tragedy if the peace and quiet of Jesus Hospital, which has existed for nearly four hundred years, and the welfare of the elderly residents was jeopardised.

These I believe are reasonable grounds for my objection.
