MEMBERS' GUIDE TO DECLARING INTERESTS IN MEETINGS

Disclosure at Meetings

If a Member has not disclosed an interest in their Register of Interests, they **must make** the declaration of interest at the beginning of the meeting, or as soon as they are aware that they have a DPI or Prejudicial Interest. If a Member has already disclosed the interest in their Register of Interests they are still required to disclose this in the meeting if it relates to the matter being discussed.

A member with a DPI or Prejudicial Interest **may make representations at the start of the item but must not take part in the discussion or vote at a meeting.** The speaking time allocated for Members to make representations is at the discretion of the Chairman of the meeting. In order to avoid any accusations of taking part in the discussion or vote, after speaking, Members should move away from the panel table to a public area or, if they wish, leave the room. If the interest declared has not been entered on to a Members' Register of Interests, they must notify the Monitoring Officer in writing within the next 28 days following the meeting.

Disclosable Pecuniary Interests (DPIs) (relating to the Member or their partner) include:

- Any employment, office, trade, profession or vocation carried on for profit or gain.
- Any payment or provision of any other financial benefit made in respect of any expenses occurred in carrying out member duties or election expenses.
- Any contract under which goods and services are to be provided/works to be executed which has not been fully discharged.
- Any beneficial interest in land within the area of the relevant authority.
- Any licence to occupy land in the area of the relevant authority for a month or longer.
- Any tenancy where the landlord is the relevant authority, and the tenant is a body in which the relevant person has a beneficial interest.
- Any beneficial interest in securities of a body where:
 - a) that body has a piece of business or land in the area of the relevant authority, and
 - b) either (i) the total nominal value of the securities exceeds £25,000 or one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that body **or** (ii) the total nominal value of the shares of any one class belonging to the relevant person exceeds one hundredth of the total issued share capital of that class.

Any Member who is unsure if their interest falls within any of the above legal definitions should seek advice from the Monitoring Officer in advance of the meeting.

A Member with a DPI should state in the meeting: ***'I declare a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest in item x because xxx. As soon as we come to that item, I will leave the room/ move to the public area for the entire duration of the discussion and not take part in the vote.'***

Or, if making representations on the item: 'I declare a Disclosable Pecuniary Interest in item x because xxx. As soon as we come to that item, I will make representations, then I will leave the room/ move to the public area for the entire duration of the discussion and not take part in the vote.'

Prejudicial Interests

Any interest which a reasonable, fair minded and informed member of the public would reasonably believe is so significant that it harms or impairs the Member's ability to judge the public interest in the item, i.e. a Member's decision making is influenced by their interest so that they are not able to impartially consider relevant issues.

A Member with a Prejudicial interest should state in the meeting: ***'I declare a Prejudicial Interest in item x because xxx. As soon as we come to that item, I will leave the room/ move to the public area for the entire duration of the discussion and not take part in the vote.'***

Or, if making representations in the item: 'I declare a Prejudicial Interest in item x because xxx. As soon as we come to that item, I will make representations, then I will leave the room/ move to the public area for the entire duration of the discussion and not take part in the vote.'

Personal interests

Any other connection or association which a member of the public may reasonably think may influence a Member when making a decision on council matters.

Members with a Personal Interest should state at the meeting: ***'I wish to declare a Personal Interest in item x because xxx'. As this is a Personal Interest only, I will take part in the discussion and vote on the matter.***

A) The Application – (Appendix A)

Applicant: CC Stim UK Tradeco 3 Limited

The application is to:

1. To Licence a town centre nightclub comprising one trading floor with a balcony area. The previous Premises Licence lapsed and the applicants had applied for identical Licensable hours and conditions to the previous Licence held.

- Seasonal Variation
An additional hour to the standard and non-standard timings on the day when British Summertime commences New Year’s Eve and Halloween permitting licensable activities until 03:30, closing at 04:00.

B) Relevant Representations Received

The sections of the RBWM Licensing Policy relevant to this application are;

6.1 Framework Hours

Having considered the evidence of alcohol related crime, disorder and anti-social behavior, the number of late-night premises and, in particular, the social, practical and regulatory impacts on the morning after the night before, the Licensing Authority has adopted a Framework Hours Policy. This Framework Hours Policy will apply to new and variation applications.

The Framework Hours are:

Premises Type	Commencement Hour for Licensable Activities No earlier than:	Terminal Hour for Licensable Activities No later than:
• Off licence	• 09.00	• 23.00
• Restaurant	• 09.00	• 01.00
• Pub/bar/night club	• 10.00	• 02.00
• Takeaway	• n/a	• 02.00

(As can be seen, the licensed hours applied for in this application fall outside RBWM framework hours for “Pub / Bar / Night Club” premises.)

Framework Hours are intended to guide applicants on the Licensing Authority’s expectations when preparing their Operating Schedule. However, if no relevant representations had been received, the application would have been granted by the Licensing Authority under delegated powers.

6.4 Wider Community Interest

The Licensing Authority considers that its licensing functions are exercised in the public interest, furthermore that the Licensing Authority is under a duty to take any steps with a view to the promotion of the licensing objectives in the interests of the wider community and not just those of the individual licence holder.

The Licensing Authority will have particular regard to those applications in close proximity to residential premises and the likely effect on the promotion of the licensing objectives in such circumstances. Subject to any relevant representations, the Licensing Authority will have particular regard to*:

- The nature of the activities

- The character of the surrounding area
- Measures for limitation of noise emissions from the premises. These may include as appropriate; noise limitation devices, sound insulation, whether windows are to be opened, the insulation of acoustic lobbies and double glazing
- Measures to deal with queuing, where necessary
- Use of outdoor areas
- Measures to deal with dispersal of customers from the premises as necessary, including the employment of door supervisors, use of dedicated Hackney Carriage / Private Hire firms, notices in the premises requesting customers to respect neighbours
- Winding down periods, particularly in public houses and nightclubs etc.
(*Note – not all of these will be relevant to this particular application)

7. Promoting the Prevention of Crime and Disorder

Where relevant representations are made, the Licensing Authority will have particular regard to the following issues* in relation to the crime and disorder objective:

- Measure to prevent bottles being carried from premises
- Use of drinks' promotions
- Measure to prevent binge drinking
- Participation in the Pub Watch Scheme
- Use of door supervisors
- Training staff in crime prevention measures
- Search procedures
- Use of close circuit television
- Lighting
- Where premises are new, designing out crime
- Quality of surveillance of premises

9. Promoting the Prevention of Public Nuisance

Where relevant representations are made, the Licensing Authority will have particular regard to the following issues* in relation to the public nuisance objective:

- The disposal of waste, particularly glass
- The use and maintenance of plant, including air extraction and ventilation systems
- Litter in the vicinity of the premises
- Noise from deliveries / collections to and from the premises
- Measures to control behaviour and queues
- Whether door supervisors are able to stay at the entrance to encourage quiet departure
- The provision of Hackney Carriage / Private Hire services at the premises
- Signs on doors and on tables encouraging consideration to the neighbours

10. Promoting the Prevention of Children from Harm

RBWM recognizes that the protection of children from harm includes the protection of children from moral, psychological and physical harm. This includes not only protecting children from the harms directly associated with alcohol consumption but also wider harms such as exposure to strong language and the need to protect children from sexual exploitation.

All applicants need to demonstrate how children and young people will be safeguarded if attending the licenced premises, or how it will be ensured that they do not gain access to the premises if not appropriate. Where relevant representations are made in relation to the protection of children from harm the Licensing Authority may impose conditions restricting the access of children or excluding them altogether from licensed premises.

Proof of Age Cards

Where necessary and appropriate, a requirement for the production of proof of age cards before any sale of alcohol is made could be attached to any premises licence or club premises certificate for the protection of children from harm.

The sections of the Guidance relevant to this application are;

Licensing objectives and aims

1.2 The legislation provides a clear focus on the promotion of four statutory objectives which must be addressed when licensing functions are undertaken.

1.3 The licensing objectives are:

- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- Public safety;
- The prevention of public nuisance; and
- The protection of children from harm.

1.4 Each objective is of equal importance. There are no other statutory licensing objectives, so that the promotion of the four objectives is a paramount consideration at all times.

1.5 However, the legislation also supports a number of other key aims and purposes. These are vitally important and should be principal aims for everyone involved in licensing work. They include:

- protecting the public and local residents from crime, anti-social behaviour and noise nuisance caused by irresponsible licensed premises;
- providing a regulatory framework for alcohol which reflects the needs of local communities and empowers local authorities to make and enforce decisions about the most appropriate licensing strategies for their local area; and
- encouraging greater community involvement in licensing decisions and giving local residents the opportunity to have their say regarding licensing decisions that may affect them.

Crime and disorder

2.1 Licensing authorities should look to the police as the main source of advice on crime and disorder. They should also seek to involve the local Community Safety Partnership (CSP).

2.3 Conditions should be targeted on deterrence and preventing crime and disorder including the prevention of illegal working in premises (see paragraph 10.10). For example, where there is good reason to suppose that disorder may take place, the presence of closed-circuit television (CCTV) cameras both inside and immediately outside the premises can actively deter disorder, nuisance, anti-social behaviour and crime generally. Some licence holders may wish to have cameras on their premises for the prevention of crime directed against the business itself, its staff, or its customers. But any condition may require a broader approach, and it may be appropriate to ensure that the precise location of cameras is set out on plans to ensure that certain areas are properly covered and there is no subsequent dispute over the terms of the condition.

Public nuisance

2.15 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.

2.16 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.

2.19 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.

2.21 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in antisocial behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.

Protection of Children from harm

2.22 The protection of children from harm includes the protection of children from moral, psychological and physical harm. This includes not only protecting children from the harms associated directly to alcohol consumption but also wider harms such as exposure to strong language and sexual expletives (for example, in the context of exposure to certain films or adult entertainment). Licensing authorities must also consider the need to protect children from sexual exploitation when undertaking licensing functions.

2.23 The Government believes that it is completely unacceptable to sell alcohol to children. Conditions relating to the access of children where alcohol is sold and which are appropriate to protect them from harm should be carefully considered.

2.26 Licensing authorities and responsible authorities should expect applicants, when preparing an operating schedule or club operating schedule, to set out the steps to be taken to protect children from harm when on the premises.

2.27 Conditions, where they are appropriate, should reflect the licensable activities taking place on the premises. In addition to the mandatory condition regarding age verification, other conditions relating to the protection of children from harm can include:

- Restrictions on the hours when children may be present;
- Restrictions or exclusions on the presence of children under certain ages when particular specified activities are taking place;
- Restrictions on the parts of the premises to which children may have access;
- Requirements for an accompanying adult (including for example, a combination of requirements which provide that children under a particular age must be accompanied by an adult); and
- Full exclusion of people under 18 from the premises when any licensable activities are taking place.

Hearings

9.38 In determining the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community, the licensing authority must give appropriate weight to:

- the steps that are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives;
- the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties;
- this Guidance;
- its own statement of licensing policy.

E) Conclusion / Summary

The Licensing Panel Sub Committee is obliged to determine this application with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives which are:

- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- Public safety;
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm.

In making its decision, the Sub Committee is also obliged to have regard to national guidance and the Council's own Licensing Policy. Of course, the Committee must have regard to all of the representations made and the evidence that it hears.

The Sub-Committee must, having regard to the application and to the relevant representations, take such step or steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps are:

- (a) Reject the application;
- (b) Refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premise's supervisor;
(*Note – not all of these will be relevant to this particular application)
- (c) Grant the application but modify the activities and/or the hours and/or the conditions of the licence;
- (d) Grant the application.

Where conditions are attached to a licence then reasons for those conditions must be given.

The Sub-Committee are reminded that any party to the hearing may appeal against the decision of the Sub-Committee to the Magistrates' Court within 21 days of the notification of the determination.

The Sub-Committee are asked to determine the application.

Financial implications: None directly but Members should be aware that any decision of the Sub-Committee may be appealed against in the Magistrates' Court and such an appeal may involve additional costs and possible costs against the Council.

Environmental/Sustainability Implications: Any authorisation under the Licensing Act 2003 may give rise to environmental implications both positive and negative depending upon the application and any measures proposed to take control adverse environmental factors.

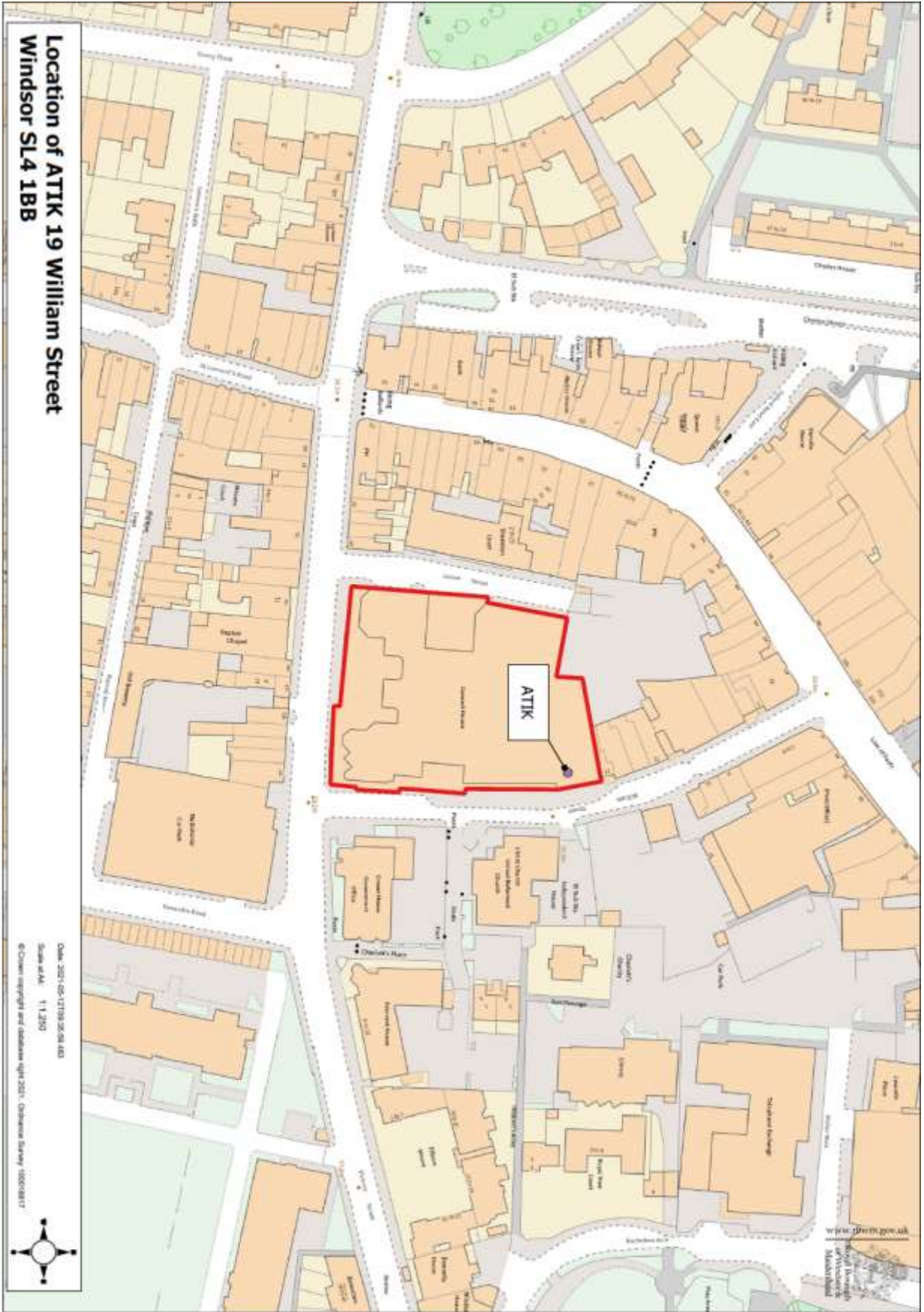

Anti Social Behaviour

Although the previous nightclub never operated in the same hours as us we still had to live with the aftermath. No matter how well they tried to clean up after a weekends opening we are always forced to sweep up debris, clean spit off our front door and remove other detritus that is not compatible with children using our facility.

Change of Use

As mentioned above, we were never open when the nightclub operated but from the application it is apparent that the new owners wish to use the premises for a multitude of different activities (all involving alcohol) that potentially could happen during the hours in which we operate (films/boxing/concerts etc) and to this we strenuously object.

Being a nursery we use the premises for a wide range of different ages but significantly we cater for babies, and as such they have quiet times and sleep times. The building is fairly well insulated but not insulated enough to avoid the noise pollution from these events and any of these activities could have a detrimental effect of the well being of children in our care. As I hope you can appreciate the noise pollution from any of these events, especially in the summer when windows are open, could be significant and will impact our ability to run our business in a way that protects the children especially if events during the day involves people queuing in the street to gain access.

Imagine a busy event during the daytime where people are queuing outside of our premises and then imagine our parents with their children trying to enter the nursery.

We also have the use of an outside space to the rear of the building and we have serious concerns about noise pollution and the effect this may have on the children and just as importantly our business.

I am well aware of the issues that the previous nightclub caused people in the local area. There have been multiple well documented stories of fights, stabbings, anti social behaviour and disorder. One other aspect to consider is the effect that this reputation has on local businesses.

We have had parents take their children out of our nursery when they saw stories in the local newspaper about another incident at these premises.

We are very concerned that by allowing the premises to operate during the day time, for such a wide array of functions coupled with allowing alcohol to be served during the day, then there will be occasions when this effects the children in our care and especially their safety, well being and development.

To this end we strongly urge you to refuse this application.

Hello,

I am writing to register my representations to the application for a premises licence by the above company at ATIK, 19 William Street, Windsor.

I am a central Windsor resident and I have lived at the town centre end of Alexandra Road for 22 years. The basis for my representation is that granting a licence for these premises will not promote licensing objectives, particularly the prevention of crime and disorder and prevention of public nuisance.

For the last year, I have not been disturbed during the night by drunken behaviour, which to me confirms that ATIK is the problem, not the pubs. The litter problem has been significantly better too.

The prevention of crime and disorder Prior to lockdown, most weekends I was disturbed by people returning to their car that is illegally parked on double yellow lines opposite my house. The nominated driver has to cajole the drunken participants into the car – which regularly takes quite a time sometimes with the engine running and doors slamming – often you will hear them urinating at the green BT box before they get into the car and discarding their takeaway wrappers. Sometimes an argument will break out between the participants of the car.

On other occasions people are walking home whilst shouting at each other – sometimes I have feared for the safety of the woman as the man shouts at her for flirting with another man in the club or some other behaviour that he has not liked. Again, this has not happened since lockdown. Sometimes they stop at the green BT box for a rest to have a drunken discussion and urinate.

Prevention of public nuisance – some of the examples above cross over into this category.

Throughout lockdown I have slept with my bedroom window open every night – not something I would ever consider doing at a weekend before.

I would love for Atik not to be granted a licence, however, I realise this is unlikely and it would therefore be appreciated if the closing time could be limited to 2.00 am at weekends and midnight on any midweek openings.

Re: Application for Premises Licence @ 19 William Street, Windsor, SL4 1BB

As a close resident to the Nightclub formerly known as "ATIK" on William Street, I would strongly and most ferociously wish to object to the proposed late licence for the new club "ATIK" due to serious concerns that the new management will fail, like the previous management, to adhere to the conditions of Section 182 late of the Licensing Act 2003.

- The prevention of crime and disorder; - Patrons of this venue congregating outside Mulberry House and other dwellings on William Street, Peascod Street, etc causing a noise disturbance, urinating or vomiting on our door step or in the vicinity.
- Public safety; - Disturbance from intoxicated patrons arguing and fighting in the early hours.
- The prevention of public nuisance; - Being constantly disturbed by noise and antisocial behavior from the patrons leaving this venue.

Whilst I appreciate that I and the other residents of Mulberry House have chosen to live in a central, Windsor town location and accept there will be some disturbance to our lives, due to general noise town pollution, I do not believe that it is necessary/essential for a town the size of Windsor to accept a venue wishing to serve alcohol until 3.00am every night of the week.

Along with the rest of the residents/owners of properties in Mulberry House, we appreciate heavier/louder noise pollution on the weekend, Friday & Saturday, however due to the number of other established late night drinking/entertainment venues in Windsor, is there the need for another late venue, especially one advertising for a late license every night of the week.

The late night revelers who used to frequent "ATIK" had no regard what so ever for the residents of any of the properties, numerous flats, on William Street. Often screaming and shouting, before and after, entering the venue, which was a common occurrence. Then sadly, when the venue closed there was a ritual of shouting, vomiting, sometime scuffles, and most often urinating/vomiting in the street. This occasionally transposed itself into our residential private hallway as young party goers sought refuge in our outside porch, hallway, and bin area.

I fully understand that noise travels, and in a street such as ours, noise in William Street echo's however, I would urge you to consider the need for the venue, when the residents should be entitled to a more peaceful, town center existence, particularly Sunday – Thursday. Most of us are still working and perhaps more than ever working from home.

I would politely but strongly ask you to consider the late license application of the venue, based on necessity of a 7 night a week, late venue, plus the number of residential properties it will adversely affect.

Dear Sir/Madam

I wish to object to the application for a premises licence at ATIK nightclub in Windsor who are seeking permission to serve alcohol from 11am to 3.15am Monday to Sunday.

My objection is based on the concern that this new licence will almost certainly increase the level of public nuisance for the many dwellings nearby, including my own. Unlike all of the other large late-night venues in the town centre, this premises is extremely close to the residential streets, of which Russell Street is the closest. There is a long history of issues that the residents of Russell Street have had to contend with as a result of this premises dragging the late-night economy to our doorsteps. We have seen fights, break-ins, stabbings, kidnaps, drug dealing, drug taking, vandalism, public indecency, and a litany of noise related issues as people pre-load before heading into the club and disperse after leaving. To be clear this is what I have witnessed happening on our residential street and we have now become accustomed to locking-down on event nights and preparing our children to contend with the aftermath left on the street the following mornings (including vomit, excrement, remnants of drinking and drug taking, broken glass, etc).

To be honest, I had previously reached a point of exasperation with the council and police in dealing with these issues and simply gave up – accepting that if the incidents above could not sway opinion, then nothing would. I preceded to replace every window in my house with secure double and secondary glazing. I had all entrances to the property reinforced. I had iron railings fitted to the side of our house. All this work had to be done to make my family feel remotely safe and comfortable in their own home – but it was only necessary around the opening hours of this premises. Even with all this work done, we are still disturbed every time there is an event at the club. I still pass the stragglers dispersing at 4.30am as I am leaving for work, and my children still ask why there is so much vomit on the street and what those empty cannisters are for.

I ask that the Licensing Committee applies some common sense to this application. Previously we were told that our complaints fell on deaf ears because the incidents couldn't be exclusively pinned on this premises (which is clearly an impossible hurdle to leap as a resident). You will, no doubt, receive the same arguments this time. However, it is necessary to look through this and acknowledge the indisputable truth that the trouble is correlated to the licenced hours of this venue and the granting a late-night licence will encourage different calibre of clientele. One that is likely to travel solely to visit this venue - who will be more likely to drive, park and pre-load and at the end of the night will disperse slower.

I would plead with you to not grant these extended hours and instead contain them to a more sensible closing time on all days – to discourage the out of borough clientele, make it easier to police, and reduce the level of nuisance to local residents.

I would be grateful if the Licensing team would consider my objection.

I am writing to register my representations to the application for a premises licence by CC Stim UK Tradeco 3 Limited for ATIK, 19 William Street, Windsor.

[REDACTED] **The basis for my representation is that granting a licence for these premises will not promote licensing objectives, particularly the prevention of crime and disorder, and prevention of public nuisance.** I would therefore like to object to the granting of the whole licence, however at the very least objecting to the proposed trading hours of the licence.

The prevention of crime and disorder and prevention of public nuisance.

Since I have lived on Russell Street my life has been heavily impacted as a result of patrons of Atik nightclub, both when pre-loading in Victoria Street Car Park ("VSCP") and on Russell Street prior to going into the club (generally around 10:30pm – 11:30pm) and when leaving the premise and moving into VSCP and the surrounding streets; namely Victoria Street, Alexandra Road and Russell Street (generally between 2:30am – 4:30am) on Friday evenings/Saturday mornings and Saturday evenings/Sunday mornings. This is also the case on special event nights, which can be both Sunday evenings/Monday mornings and Thursday evenings/Friday mornings. Whilst I understand that it may be difficult to prove with certainty that people outside my house, in VSCP and on the surrounding streets are going into/and have left Atik, when you consider the times that all the issues occur (please see details below), then it becomes highly likely that the patrons causing the issues are those related to Atik.

Since 2014, I have experienced, and been witness to, many incidents and crimes which I believe are a result of patrons going into/leaving Atik. These crimes range from ASB, significant noise (regularly on Friday nights/Saturday mornings and Saturday nights/Sunday mornings, to serious crimes that I am sure you are already fully aware of, such as an attempted abduction, knife crime and sexual assaults. I am a mother of two young girls, and I am sure you can imagine the scenes I have had to endure on both Saturday and Sunday mornings which I have had to deal with. Within the first year that I moved into my home, I had a man attempt to break into my premises at 4:00am on a Sunday morning (whilst I was asleep and on my own in the house); he had been in a fight that had originated in the Kebab House on Victoria Street; he had been at Atik that night. I have phoned 101 to report a very high number of crimes and incidents since I moved into my house in 2014 all relating to ASB, significant noise on the streets and in VSCP, fighting and above-mentioned crimes.

As I hope you appreciate from the above, my life, and my family's life, is regularly and significantly disrupted as a result of incidents happening at the above-mentioned days/times. This regularly impacts my sleep, and my two young children's sleep, at weekends and will often lead me to sleepless nights from the concern that the Friday and Saturday night 'activity' will bring. When I am awoken in early hours, I hope you can understand the difficulty in getting my children back to sleep whilst also often having to call 101 to report an incident going on outside my house, or within VSCP. My family has had two Christmas Days significantly impacted as a result of the Christmas Eve events held in Atik. I do not feel that this is a fair way that I have to live my life each weekend, even in a town environment.

Whilst I appreciate that you may feel that the incidents and issues I am referring to may not necessarily be a direct result of patrons of Atik, I have had no issues, nor been required to call 101, since March 2020 when the premises was closed as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic (I

know that the premise was open for a short period during the summer of 2020 but there were very tight restrictions in place on patrons inside the club and on the trading hours, both of which may have likely deterred a number of patrons, particularly those outside of the borough). Even during the times (including at present) when the nearby pubs/bars, such as The Corner House and The Windlesora have been open, yet Atik has had to remain closed, I have had no issues, no sleepless nights, no need to call 101 to report any incidents, no having to resettle my children from being woken from ASB and significant noise. This therefore strongly indicates to me that the issues I have had to endure relate to Atik. As such I would like to object to the granting of the whole licence on this basis and plead with the committee to take a holistic and common-sense approach to the licence application.

I would also like to add that I have spent a considerable amount of money adding security to my house (principally as a result of the attempted break-in and the attempted abduction) and have installed double and secondary glazing to the windows as a preventative measure to hearing the ASB and noise.


I am fully aware of the policies and procedures that the previous owners of Atik had in place in relation to dispersing patrons when the club closed, and that the club were effective at dispersing patrons away from the club and off William Street. However, the issue of then dispersing patrons away from Victoria Street, VSCP, Alexandra Road and Russell Street then becomes a matter for Thames Valley Police. This I see as a significant drain on the resources of Thames Valley Police. I understand that the ultimate owners of **CC Stim UK Tradeco 3 Limited are the same as those who owned Atik, hence why I see the running and operation of the 'new' Atik club as a direct extension of the 'old' Atik club and therefore nothing is likely to change.**

At the very least, I would like to object to the granting of the trading hours; these currently being 3:15am to serve alcohol and then 3:45am to close. Given that the incidents and issues that I have faced when the club has been open predominately relate to 2:30am – 4:30am. I would like to ask that the committee considers reducing the current proposed hours to be: (a) more reasonable for residents who are likely to be woken and disturbed in the night; and (b) are aligned with other night-time economy venues (which therefore might help to not attract such significant volumes of patrons to the club, and especially those from outside of the borough area, such as London). I understand that in relation to two of the serious crimes, they were related to gangs/groups from outside of the borough.

I sincerely hope that you strongly take into account my representations when considering the granting of this licence, as it has put significant strain on my life and my family's life prior to March 2020. I would often dread the disruption and potential safety in my house on Friday and Saturday nights, and as a result would try to stay away over weekends in order to ensure a safe night's sleep for my children. These past 14 months have been so comforting and enjoyable to be a resident of Windsor town centre. I am already starting to dread and prepare for the opening of the club in June, and particularly on the first weekend after opening.

Dear Committee Members,

I am writing to register our representations to the application for a premises licence by CC Stim UK Tradeco 3 Ltd for ATIK, 19 William Street, Windsor. We strongly object to the proposed licence for the premises.

We are a business based in William Street in Windsor, the same street as the proposed licence. Our business is 'The Little Gym Windsor'. We run children's activities and classes from our premises. Our youngest members are just 4 months of age, and we cater for children up until 12 years of age. We are open across the week, in addition to both days at the weekend, teaching children in gymnastics, movement and child development classes. We have been operating from our premises in Windsor for several years, and approximately 400 babies, toddlers and primary school-aged children attend our sports & education classes each week.

There are several other children's businesses also operating from William Street in Windsor. We have heard it called the new 'children's street' by RBWM residents. Current children's businesses include The Little Gym Windsor, The Jelly Lounge, and also the William Street Nursery. The businesses bring significant family footfall into central Windsor on a daily and weekly basis. And we have GRAVE CONCERNS for the safety of the children attending these businesses should the licence be approved by the council.

It is not appropriate for a new licence to be granted to the nightclub on William Street for the safety of children, the prevention of crime & disorder, in the interests of public safety, and in the prevention of public nuisance.

Granting a licence for these premises will not promote licensing objectives: the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and prevention of public nuisance, and also the protection of children from harm. We include real-life examples drawn from our experience with previous licence granted to the same site -- ATIK, and we object strenuously to a new licence being granted for the safety of children and families (and our employees!).

1. **The prevention of crime and disorder.** Our premises have frequently been targeted on Thursday, Friday & Saturday nights by patrons of the nightclub. We have had instances of vandalism including signage ripped off the outer wall of our building (on more than one occasion) and graffiti sprayed on our front windows. Prior to the first lockdown, when the previous licenced venue was in operation, we would be greeted with broken glass outside our door nearly every Saturday and Sunday morning. We would also be greeted with pools of vomit. On one occasion, the vomit was so bad that it was in a waterfall down our front door. We even have a broom inside our premises that has 'Vomit Broom' written on it, and is used by staff on weekends when we need to clean up our entrance before our young children walk through the human excrement and into our facility. We have also been subjected to dangerous Nitrous canisters (the silver canisters) littering around our door -- irresistible to young children who want to pick them up and play with them.

Please note that we have had NO vandalism, have NOT been subjected to any crime, nor had any glass or vomit at our entrance, nor anyone urinating against our doors since the venue has been closed. There is a clear link between the anti-social behaviour we have experienced and the licence at the venue on William Street.

2. **Public safety.** We would like to cite ALL of the above in point one as issues of public safety. Vomit in our entrance way, silver canisters around our door, and urination on our door, in addition to the glasses shattered around our premise entry, are a clear danger to the young children attending The Little Gym Windsor for classes. In normal times, these would be viewed as an extremely undesirable hygiene issue for the children and families attending all of the children's businesses on William Street. However, at a time of Covid and a GLOBAL PANDEMIC they take on an catastrophic potential risk to the children and families that frequent this family-orientated street in Windsor. The risk of infection from the human excrement, vomit and urine is not acceptable at the current time. A licence such as this should not be granted in the interests of public safety in such a high-thoroughfare area (neighbouring several children's activity businesses). A business such as this would be better situated in an industrial estate with reduced footfall from children and families.

3. **Prevention of public nuisance.** The previous licence resulted in significant public nuisance. Without wanting to repeat myself again, I would like to cite all of the above examples. Every week during the operation of the previous licence we witnessed some or all of the following: urination against our door and building, vomit at our entrance (on one occasion projectile vomit down our front door), silver canisters littering the entryway to our building, stains and smell from overnight urination around our door, spray-painted graffiti on our front window, and signage ripped off both our front door and also the front wall of our facility (needing to be replaced at some expense in each instance). Working on the street, we have seen first hand the public nuisance caused by the previous licence. And we are horrified to think that the council may be considering offering a licence such as that in the proposal to another nightclub planning to open on the premises.

4. **Protection of children from harm.** RBWM has a responsibility to protect local children from harm. William Street is a hub for families in Windsor and features no less than three businesses whose sole purpose is the provision of activities for children. William Street Nursery, which provides nursery and childcare services to babies and young children. The Jelly Lounge, a soft play facility for children from birth upwards. And The Little Gym Windsor, our business, which provides sports and education classes for children from 4 months of age up until 12 years. The street is full of children and their families during the day, and it is not safe for these children (many learning to walk) to be dodging the hygiene risk presented by vomit and urine, or the risk of injury presented by shards of glass. It is wholly inappropriate for the licence to be granted taking the surrounding environment and usage of the neighbouring businesses into account.

We thank the RBWM for taking our representation into account. We feel passionate about making a positive difference to the lives of local children, and it is the reason our business exists. As part of that mission, we also take protecting the children in our care extremely seriously, and that starts out on the street prior to entry to our facility. The licence being considered would result in a) crime & disorder; b) a risk to public safety; c) a risk to the health & safety of children; and d) public nuisance behaviour. We firmly believe that granting this licence would breach the above four planning principles and would not promote planning objectives.

Dear Committee Members,

I am writing to register my representations to the application for a premises licence by CC Stim UK Tradeco 3 Ltd for ATIK, 19 William Street, Windsor.

I am a central Windsor resident where I have lived for five years, although have lived in Eton and Windsor for 20 years. The evidence within this statement relates to my personal experience as a resident whose life has been significantly impacted and disrupted by the ASB, crime and disorder that can be attributed to ATIK. *(Many of the incidents evidenced were reported to TVP and RBWM Community Safety Team).*

The basis for my representation is that granting a licence for these premises will not promote licensing objectives, particularly the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and prevention of public nuisance.

1. Prevention of crime and disorder

Windsor and its residents' lives are significantly impacted and disrupted by the anti-social behaviour, noise, nuisance and crime that is directly attributed to ATIK nightclub, predominantly on Friday and Saturday nights (into Sunday morning).

Patrons of ATIK congregate in Victoria Street car park to pre load with alcohol and legal highs, remnants of which are scattered in the venue and car park environs.

(Please note that RBWM have limited access to the car park on a Thursday to Saturday evening from 9pm as a preventative measure – whilst helpful it has displaced ATIK patrons to the local streets)

There is then a reoccurrence of ASB and crime between 3am-4am, exacerbated because of the intoxicated state of people, that spills into ATIK environs, including Subway and the kebab shop, causing further misery, distress and fear for residents.

I have had to call police numerous times over the past few years due to crime and disorder in my street and outside my house, all of which can be directly linked to ATIK due to the proximity and closing time. Several serious assaults and sexual assaults have occurred where the suspect and/or victim have been in ATIK.

ATIK is clearly a crime generator for Windsor and there is a clear correlation between ATIK and crime and disorder both inside and outside its premises. This is evidenced in the past year as there has been zero incidents due to ATIKs closure. One cannot emphasise what a difference this has made to my quality of life as not being constantly disturbed each weekend by ATIK patrons shouting, fighting, screaming and not having to clear up vomit and litter in the morning or have to walk around crime scenes at the end of the street. One morning my neighbour's car was damaged and was covered in blood. Residents are scared to walk past ATIK in the evening due to the intimidating and unruly behaviour of its patrons.

2. Public Safety

I am concerned regarding the balcony area as detailed in the application. If outside, there is a risk of people falling or even worse being pushed during a fight and the noise will emanate to surrounding streets, causing more misery for residents.

ATIK have previously failed in its responsibility re the safety of their patrons by hosting "£1 a shot" promotions. This is wholly irresponsible and encourages patrons to drink excessively and become drunk or ill, which breaches licensing conditions and fails to protect the young people who attend the venue and leave them more susceptible of becoming a victim of crime, especially young women who are at risk of sexual assault. I see that they are already advertising their opening in June.

3. Prevention of public nuisance

I can see no reason why ATIK wishes to operate Monday to Sunday until 3.15am, especially when it is such close proximity to residential streets. As abovementioned, the noise emanating from the premises and the patrons dispersing from the premises causes significant disruption, misery and fear for local residents. This misery is

especially compounded with weekday events e.g. music events or Halloween as most people work the following day. By being continually disturbed, it has a detrimental impact on quality of life which is totally unacceptable.

On Thursday 29th November 2018, ATIK hosted "Tony Lanez" until 3.30am. Cars were illegally parked in surrounding streets. I had cars parked outside my house at midnight with engines running. I called TVP as it was extremely intimidating having gangs of men congregating in the street. I recall one Armistice weekend when I was working in London at 8am, I was awoken at 3.30am for several hours by ATIK patrons causing a disturbance in the street. I was therefore extremely tired for the Armistice Day Parade - another example of how this impacts one's day to day life.

4. Conditions

In relation to existing conditions, I have concerns regarding ANNEX 2 - 8) which could lull the committee into a false sense of security. This is not a process that feeds into any formal analytical product used for policing/community safety oversight and therefore cannot be measured.

There are no conditions relating to safeguarding, in particular focusing on protection of women from sexual offences and inappropriate behaviour. I would have expected a company in the night time economy to highlight their commitment to keeping women safe with the introduction of a Women's Night Safety Charter and welfare and vulnerability engagement training for their bar staff. Failure to recognise this is a major concern that safeguarding is not a priority for CC Stim UK Tradeco 3 Ltd. These are critical conditions for any licensed premises.

To conclude, granting a licence for ATIK would be of no benefit to Windsor as it is an ASB and crime generator draining the resources of TVP and the Local Authority wardens and environmental teams. I have evidenced the wide range of issues that residents have endured where there is a causal link to ATIK and it is totally unacceptable to expect residents to continue to do so by granting a new licence.

[REDACTED] on the grounds of preventing a public nuisance, to the granting of licensable activities between the hours of 1100am to 0315am every day at the above premises.

Mulberry House in William Street, only a few doors away from ATIK, is a residential building of 13 flats. Before the lockdown in March 2020 when the previous owners operated the night club, we were frequently woken up in the early hours of the morning when youngsters, often inebriated and noisy, spilled out into William Street. They were often disorderly, sometimes urinating and vomiting on our front doorstep, leaving litter and, on a couple of occasions, breaking into our bin store.

We urge you to reduce the hours when alcohol can be served on the premises. We suggest that a licence permitting the sale of alcohol up until midnight, rather than 0315am, would be an appropriate compromise.

Subject: Representation against application to grant Premises Licence ATIK Windsor

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Dear Committee

As a resident of central Windsor I wish to make a formal representation against the application for the grant of a Premises Licence being made by CC Stim UK Tradeco 3 Limited for Premises known as ATIK, 19 William Street, Windsor, SL4 1BB.

I make this representation based on my personal experiences relating to significant and repeated anti-social behaviour, crime and public nuisance caused by customers of the aforementioned premises.

My greatest concern relates to crime and disorder. On the evenings when the nightclub is operational the surrounding streets are filled with “clubbers” pre-drinking on the streets, consuming not only alcohol but increasingly consuming nitrous oxide (laughing gas) and other illegal substances. This makes the area feel incredibly unsafe as the behaviour of these individuals is erratic and unpredictable.

Those coming to and particularly leaving the premises in the early hours also create a significant public nuisance through the high levels of noise (shouting/screaming), revving of car engines, screeching of car tyres and sadly by the almost predictable fighting and violence. There have been numerous occasions when we have been woken to nightclub patrons fighting outside our home and in our street. The late night licence of ATIK is rather unique in Windsor therefore it is easy to attribute these issues to patrons of the premises. In recent times, pre-COVID, there were two violent sexual assaults in the Victoria Street carpark and another violent assault in Alexandra Road – all attributed to ATIK customers and all occurring in the early hours of the morning.

The volume of littering associated with customers of ATIK is frankly disgusting. Windsor is a historic and beautiful town, a place I am proud to call home, however after club nights the surrounding streets and carparks can be regularly found covered in discarded alcohol containers, small silver gas canisters as well as debris from various fast food establishments. This alone is sickening to see but is frequently worsened by the addition of every imaginable bodily substance, here I specifically refer to urine, vomit and all too frequently blood. There are two neighbouring premises to ATIK that provide childcare and indoor play spaces for children, the broken glass, discarded cigarette ends and bodily fluids are not only disgusting but present significant risk to these poor children and their parents.

On the evenings when ATIK is trading William Street is often packed full of police and other first responder vehicles, in anticipation of the decanting of intoxicated patrons. This is an unnecessary burden on the police force and a waste of valuable resource and money. The problem of intoxicated customers and the issues they create is highlighted by the operation of <https://streetangelswindsor.org/>, a charity who support vulnerable people – a charity who aim to support the homeless community but instead end up literally picking up drunks from the street who have poured out of ATIK.

ATIK has consistently failed to meet its Licensing obligations and has become a known hot-spot for crime and disorder in the community. The establishment fails in its duty to protect public safety with regular events promoting low-cost, high volume alcohol that encourage excessive drinking and actually fuels many of the issues I have raised. This reckless attitude continues with the planned reopening of ATIK on 21st June, their “straightouttalockdown” event is being openly marketed on their website as a “bin the mask” event. This is a venue that is targeting the 18-25 year old members of society, to openly promote this to a community that will not be vaccinated at that point in time and following from what has been perhaps the greatest global health threat in the last century is wholly irresponsible. This event

is also planned for a Monday evening, which means a high probability of being awoken at 3-4am on Tuesday morning prior to a day at work, further evidence that the community is not being considered.

I note the development of a number of new, much needed residential properties in the areas close to ATIK, including the library carpark and Bachelors Acre with a planned new 124 bed hotel being proposed off Bachelors acre/Peascod Street. This is indicative of progressive change for our town and also a change in the needs of our town. The reopening of ATIK contradicts this and has, in contrast, no benefits to the town or its residents. Based on the information provided I respectfully request that this application for a Premises Licence should not be allowed to proceed and the premises not be permitted to reopen. If the decision is made to grant a licence then at the very least the trading hours should be re-evaluated with weekday events ending by midnight and weekend events by 2am, in line with the other late night premises in Windsor.

Following the guidance on making representations provided on the rbwm website I can state that I would be willing to attend a hearing to provide any further evidence as required.

All staff authorised to sell alcohol should be trained in underage sales training as well as the 'Challenge 25' policy with appropriate training documented to reflect this and made available to an appropriate authority such as the Police, licensing or trading standards colleagues.

Within the original licensing conditions it states the 'Challenge 25' policy implemented, however they also confusingly state they have notices stating Challenge 21;

So just to clarify Challenge 25 with appropriate signage

2. Use of an ID scanning system to record acceptable ID which should include photographic identification documents; including passport, photo-card, driving license or proof of age card bearing the PASS hologram or any identification recognised or approved by either the Licensing/Responsible Authority or Thames Valley Police.

3. Make staff aware of the possibility of Proxy sales of age related products such as alcohol.

4. A refusal book/log/electronic log to be in use at the premises to record all relevant incidents and updated as and when required, and made available for inspection on request by either a Responsible Authority such as Licensing or Trading Standards or the Police.

ANNEX 1 - Mandatory Conditions

- No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence:
 - i. at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - ii. at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
 Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
 2) In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises-
 - a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-
 - i. drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - ii. drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise)
 - b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
 - e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- The responsible person shall ensure that free portable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy
 (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph date of birth and either -
 - a. a holographic mark, or
 - b. an ultraviolet feature.
- The responsible person shall ensure that -
 - (a) Where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available in the following measures -
 - (i) beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
 - (iii) still wine in a glass: 125ml; and
 - (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises, and
 - (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

A responsible person in relation to a licensed premises means the holder of the premise licence in respect of the premises, the designated premises supervisor (if any) or any individual aged 18 or over who is authorised by either the licence holder or designated premises supervisor. For premises with a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity that which enables him to prevent the supply of alcohol.
- 1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 2) For the purpose of the condition set out in paragraph 1 -

(a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979(6)

(b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula -

$$P = D + (D \times V)$$

where -

- i) P is the permitted price.
- ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date for the sale or supply of the alcohol and
- iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol.

(c) "relevant person" means, in relation to the premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

- i) the holder of the premises licence.
- ii) the designated premises supervisor.
- iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

(d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

(e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994(7).

- 3) Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
(2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.
- Any individual employed to carry out a security activity must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority (SIA).
- Admission of children is restricted in accordance with the recommendation by the British Board of Film Classification. If the film has not been classified the restriction of children must be approved by the Licensing Authority. (Children means any person under 18 years).

ANNEX 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

General

- None

Prevention of Crime and Disorder

- 1) A register of SIA Security Personnel shall be kept. The register will show the following details:
 - a) Full SIA registration number.
 - b) Date and time that the Door Supervisor commenced duty, countersigned by the Designated Premises Supervisor or Duty Manager.
 - c) Date and time that the Door Supervisor finished work, countersigned by the Designated Premises Supervisor or Duty Manager.
 - d) Any occurrence or incident of interest involving crime and disorder or public safety must be recorded giving names of the Door Supervisor involved.

- e) A record of the number of patrons on site shall be made half hourly in the door register.
 - f) Training records.
 - g) ID photo and scan of SIA badge.
- 2) The SIA Security Personnel register shall be kept at the premises and be available for inspection by an authorised officer of Thames Valley Police, or an authorised Licensing Officer from the Local Authority and shall be retained for a period of 1 year.
- 3) The Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) and Premises Licence Holder (PLH) shall ensure that a policy relating to the safe removal of persons from the premises and/or its immediate vicinity by staff and door supervisors shall be put in place and actively operated. The policy shall be in written format and made available upon request to an authorised Licensing Officer of the Local Authority and Thames Valley Police. This shall include but not be limited to:
- a) Persons who have been identified by staff as being vulnerable or at risk.
 - b) Persons who are refused entry to the premises or refused service within the premises.
 - c) Persons who are ejected from the premises.
- 4) Whilst SIA Security Personnel are employed at the premises all will be deployed with digitally recording Body Worn Video (BWV). The BWV will be used to record any incidents which occur inside or outside of the premises involving customers, prospective customers or any staff member that impact on any of the four licensing objectives. Data recordings shall be made immediately available to an authorised officer of Thames Valley Police or an authorised Licensing Officer from the Local Authority together with facilities for viewing upon request, subject to the provisions of the Data Protection Act.
- 5) The Premises Licence Holder (PLH) shall ensure that all SIA Security Personnel whilst employed at the premises shall wear high visibility jackets/tabards in order to be clearly visible and identifiable at all times to the public and via CCTV both internally and externally. When tabards are worn, high visibility armbands must be worn that incorporate displaying SIA badges. If high visibility full sleeved jackets are worn the PLH must ensure that all SIA Security Personnel badges are also displayed via an easily visible arm band of a different high visibility colour to the jacket that is being worn.
- 6) All SIA Security Personnel employed at the premises will be trained in respect of an operational plan specific to ATIK Windsor and a signed training record to confirm the same will be maintained for production to Thames Valley Police upon request.
- 7) The Premises Licence Holder shall use reasonable endeavours to ensure that when two or more SIA Security Personnel are on duty, at least one to be female.
- 8) During operating hours the DPS or nominated representative shall be available to receive and respond to nuisance related complaints from local residents. A contact number shall be readily available to residents. Reasonable steps will be taken to recognise the need of local residents which can also include regular residents meetings if required.
- 9) All events using promoters, not normally associated with the premise, shall require notification to Thames Valley Police a minimum of ten (10) working days prior to the event taking place, where practicable, unless the Premises Licence Holder can evidence it was asked less than 10 days before to hold the event, when less than ten (10) working days' notice will be accepted, the notification shall identify the promoter, the event being promoted and the nature of the music being promoted.
- 10) These events shall be subject to a full risk assessment, to be carried out by DPS, or a nominated individual and be made available on request to an authorised officer of Thames Valley Police.
- 11) The risk assessment shall identify when tickets are sold in advance and/or to be available on the night. The risk assessment shall include the requirement for additional measures when searching for illegal drugs and weapons, additional door supervisors including female door supervisors, venue staff, briefing details to all staff, reference checks on all promoters and DJs and where appropriate and the use of search wands.
- 12) Re-admittance for existing customers leaving the premises shall be subject to a search by the SIA Security Personnel when re-entering the premises.
- 13) When events are held for children under the age of eighteen years of age, a written Risk Assessment provided to Thames Valley Police at least ten (10) working days prior to a proposed event.
- 14) The Premises Licence Holder shall implement a written search policy (following discussion with Thames Valley Police), to minimise the risk of illegal weapons and drugs being brought onto the premises, including search, detection, confiscation, storage and disposal of drugs procedures. The search policy shall provide, as a minimum:
- a) For 100% bag search of all customers attempting to enter the premises.
 - b) For searches of any customer when considered appropriate by PLH's, SIA Security Personnel or PLH Management based on risk assessment of the night in question; minimum 50%
 - c) For the operation of intelligence led searches of any customer as required.
 - d) Search Arch to be in place and used during operation hours, if possible. Records to be kept to include details of persons refused. These records to be maintained and made available to Thames Valley Police or Licensing Officers of the Local Authority.
- 15) Notices shall be displayed advising the public that the right to conduct an outer body search is reserved as a condition of entry, and that the Thames Valley Police shall be informed if anyone is found in possession of illegal drugs or offensive weapons.
- 16) Retail Radio to be used and for SIA Security Personnel to use the radio to alert other venues of persons that have been refused entry/ejected.

Challenge 25 and Club Scan

- 17) At all times that the premises is operating under this licence the Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that its staff operate a Challenge 25 Policy (to minimise the risk of alcohol being sold to underage customers). This Policy shall (as a minimum) provide that before entry (or alternately before any sale of alcohol), any person who appears to be under the age of 21 will be required to produce photo ID in the form of a passport; driving licence, UK Military ID card; PASS (or similar) card to prove that he/she is over the age of 18, before being permitted.

18) Notices advertising the Challenge 21 and proof of age policies shall be displayed in prominent places in the premises so that they can be seen internally and externally.

19) The DPS shall ensure that all confiscated ID's are handed to Thames Valley Police as soon as practicable and to alert, if practicable, Thames Valley Police in relation to under age persons attempting to gain entry to the premises.

ID Checks

20) An ID scanning system will be employed at the premises and will be utilised for all customers. This will be in operation 7 days per week when SIA Security Personnel are on duty.

a) ID SCAN or other similar equipment shall be available as a condition of entry

b) Operate 100% ID scanning for all customers during Licensable hours

c) "Customer" for the purposes of this condition shall not apply to headline performers and regular staff

members whose identity is already known to PLH staff.

21) The ID Scan Device shall record the names and dates of birth of all persons entering the premises and retain the image and details of the ID. These records shall be kept for a minimum of thirty one days and shall be made available to any authorised Officer of Thames Valley Police.

22) Records shall be made available to an authorised officer of Thames Valley Police or a Licensing Officer of the Local Authority together with facilities for viewing with immediate access by a person qualified to operate the system;

23) Any breakdown or system failure will be notified to Thames Valley Police immediately and repaired as soon as practicable;

24) Condition 20 and 21 will be suspended whilst the machinery or system is being repaired.

Staff Training

25) The Premises Licence Holder shall ensure that all staff employed in the sale of alcohol shall be trained in their responsibilities and a record of their training shall be maintained. These records shall be made available to any authorised Officer of TVP or a Licensing Officer of the Local Authority. This training shall formally take place once every 12 months and signed records of this training shall be maintained.

Hours of Operation and Entry Restrictions

26) The terminal hour for cessation of alcohol on Mondays to Sundays shall be 03:15 with the premises closing at 03:45. No new customers will be admitted to the premises after 01:30, 7 days per week. The terminal hour for cessation of alcohol on New Year's Eve and Halloween shall be 03:30am with the premises closing at 04:00am. An additional hour to the standard and non-standard timings on the day when British Summertime commences. In the event of any international sporting event involving any of the countries from the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland which falls outside the current permitted hours on the Premises Licence to permit the premises to open one hour prior to the start of the event and finishing one hour after the end of the event, the details of the transmission to be notified to Thames Valley Police seven (7) days beforehand and provided Thames Valley Police have not objected to the additional hours within 72 hours of being notified.

Dispersal

27) A written closure and dispersal policy, following discussions with Thames Valley Police, for controlling the closing of the premises and the departure of customers at the conclusion of the licensed activities shall be put in place and shall be actively operated. This policy shall be made available to any authorised Officer of Thames Valley Police or an authorised Licensing Officer of the Local Authority. The dispersal policy should include use of door staff assisting in the dispersal and the use of Body Worn Cameras.

28) Whilst dealing with the dispersal of patrons the SIA Security Personnel shall wear full high visibility vests.

29) If a DJ is used on any night then he/she will ask customers to leave quietly.

30) The existing CCTV system will continue to operate during trading.

31) Notices stating that CCTV is in operation 24 hours a day will be displayed throughout the venue.

32) The external area used for the consumption of alcohol will be covered by the existing CCTV system

33) Any person who appears to be intoxicated or who is behaving disorderly will not be allowed entry to the venue. Any person within this venue who appears to be intoxicated or who is behaving disorderly will be given care and consideration in leaving the venue.

34) Radios will be used by security and management and monitored by a responsible member of staff.

35) Toughened glass will continue to be used.

36) The venue will actively participate in the local Pubwatch or equivalent scheme, when in existence

37) The venue intends to have specially organised events for the youth market when the venue will adhere to policies and procedural documentation in relation to this type of event. A copy of which can be provided on request to the authorities.

Public Safety

38) At least one qualified first aider to be present when licensable activities are taking place

Prevention of Public Nuisance

39) Reasonable steps will be taken to recognise the need of local residents and businesses

Protection of Children from Harm

- 40) A person under the age of 18 years will only visit the venue with a responsible adult usually for the purpose of dining unless there is an event especially organised for the youth market.
- 41) Unaccompanied persons under the age of 18 are not welcome in the venue except at events especially organised for the youth market.
- 42) A person under 18 years will not be allowed to use the AWP machine.
- 43) To allow children aged 16 and 17 years of age to attend privately booked cooperate events at the premises. The Local Police and Council Licensing Officer will be contacted prior to any event of this type taking place at the premises.
- 44) Non-transferable wrist bands will be shown to all adults on the production of photographic ID, namely a passport, driving licence or ID bearing the pass hologram.

ANNEX 3 - Conditions attached after a Hearing by the Licensing Authority

Licensing Panel Sub-Committee Panel Hearing Decision - 11th August 2014

- 1) A digital CCTV monitoring system be installed and maintained to Thames Valley Police standard (i.e. CCTV images be clear and of an evidential quality and the system clock should be set correctly and kept accurate). Recordings be kept securely for 31 days and made available to Police, Local Authority Licensing Officers and relevant Agencies
- 2) A nominated person be trained on how to work the CCTV system to the standard where the nominated person can download any potential evidence required by Thames Valley Police employees and Local Authority Licensing Officers.
- 3) A nominated person be responsible in supplying the necessary media (disc, data stick) containing any downloaded content.
- 4) Thames Valley Police be provided with copies of the Risk Assessment for any Boxing/Wrestling event 14 days before the event date.
- 5) Thames Valley Police be provided with the fight card details for any Boxing/Wrestling event 14 days before the event date.
- 6) Noise arising from any PA or amplified or live music, vocalisation, live or recorded event transmission or any other source during indoor sporting events and boxing, wrestling, karate, wrestling and other forms of martial arts shall not be audible at any time outside the nearest residential premises when assessed one metre from the nearest residential boundary.
- 7) All windows, doors (with the exception of access and egress) must remain closed during regulated entertainment i.e. the playing of recorded and live music performances and during indoor sporting events, boxing, wrestling, karate and other forms of martial arts.
- 8) The disposal of bottles into waste receptacles outside the premises shall not be permitted between 2200hrs and 0800hrs.
- 9) Notices will be prominently displayed at exits requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 10) Notices shall be prominently displayed at any area used for smoking requesting patrons respect the needs of local residents and use the area quietly.
- 11) The premises licence holder shall ensure that any queue to enter the premises which forms outside the premises is orderly and supervised by door staff so as to ensure that there is no public nuisance or obstruction of the public highway.
