A) The Application

Applicant: - Charul Patel

Premises: - Costcutter, 113-117 Springfield Road, Windsor, SL4 3 PZ

The application relates to an application for a new premises licence.

A summary of the application is as follows:-

The standard opening hours of the premises:

06.00 until 23.00 hrs Monday to Sunday

To permit the sale by retail of alcohol for consumption OFF the premises:

• 06.00 until 23.00 hrs Monday to Sunday

Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS): Charul Patel

This is a brand new application for a premises licence, the premises itself has not held a premises licence before, and to the best of our knowledge has been an electrical retail outlet for many years. The application has been made outside of the current framework hours within the RBWM licensing policy (this is detailed further within the report).

Trading Standards have requested a number of conditions relating to one of the four key objectives;- Prevention of children from harm - which is attached, however, these have been agreed by the applicant.

C) It is considered that the following policies have a bearing upon the application.

182 National Guidance April 2018

The sub committee must have regard to the amended Secretary of States guidance issued in April 2018 under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and in particular Chapters 9 (Determining applications) and 10 (Conditions attached to Premises Licences). Particular regard should be had to paragraphs 9.31 – 9.41 (Hearings) and 9.42 – 9.44 (Determining actions that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives).

Also the following relevant sections

Crime and Disorder

- 2.1 Licensing authorities should look to the police as the main source of advice on crime and disorder. They should also seek to involve the local Community Safety Partnership (CSP).
- 2.3 Conditions should be targeted on deterrence and preventing crime and disorder including the prevention of illegal working in premises (see paragraph 10.10). For example, where there is good reason to suppose that disorder may take place, the presence of closed-circuit television (CCTV) cameras both inside and immediately outside the premises can actively deter disorder, nuisance, anti-social behaviour and crime generally. Some licence holders may wish to have cameras on their premises for the prevention of crime directed against the business itself, its staff, or its customers. But any condition may require a broader approach, and it may be appropriate to ensure that the precise location of cameras is set out on plans to ensure that certain areas are properly covered and there is no subsequent dispute over the terms of the condition.
- 2.5 Conditions relating to the management competency of designated premises supervisors should not normally be attached to premises licences. It will normally be the responsibility of the premises licence holder as an employer, and not the licensing

authority, to ensure that the managers appointed at the premises are competent and appropriately trained. The designated premises supervisor is the key person who will usually be responsible for the day to day management of the premises by the premises licence holder, including the prevention of disorder. A condition of this kind may only be justified as appropriate in rare circumstances where it can be demonstrated that, in the circumstances associated with particular premises, poor management competency could give rise to issues of crime and disorder and public safety.

2.6 The prevention of crime includes the prevention of immigration crime including the prevention of illegal working in licensed premises. Licensing authorities should work with Home Office Immigration Enforcement, as well as the police, in respect of these matters. Licence conditions that are considered appropriate for the prevention of illegal working in the licensed premises might include requiring a premises licence holder to undertake right to work check on all staff employed at the licensed premises or requiring that a copy of any documents checked as part of a right to work check are retained at the licensed premises.

Public nuisance

- 2.15 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.
- 2.16 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It may include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.
- 2.18 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions may be appropriate.

Protection of Children from harm

- 2.22 The protection of children from harm includes the protection of children from moral, psychological and physical harm. This includes not only protecting children from the harms associated directly to alcohol consumption but also wider harms such as exposure to strong language and sexual expletives (for example, in the context of exposure to certain films or adult entertainment). Licensing authorities must also consider the need to protect children from sexual exploitation when undertaking licensing functions.
- 2.23 The Government believes that it is completely unacceptable to sell alcohol to children. Conditions relating to the access of children where alcohol is sold and which are appropriate to protect them from harm should be carefully considered.
 - A member or members of the current management have been convicted for serving alcohol to minors or with a reputation for allowing underage drinking (other than in the context of the exemption in the 2003 Act relating to 16 and 17 year olds consuming beer, wine and cider when accompanied by an adult during a table meal);
- 2.26 Licensing authorities and responsible authorities should expect applicants, when preparing an operating schedule or club operating schedule, to set out the steps to be taken to protect children from harm when on the premises.
- 2.28 Please see also Chapter 10 for details about the Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010.
- 2.29 Licensing authorities should give considerable weight to representations about child protection matters. In addition to the responsible authority whose functions relate directly to child protection, the Director Public Health may also have access to relevant evidence to inform such representations. These representations may include, amongst other things, the use of health data about the harms that alcohol can cause to underage drinkers. Where a responsible authority, or other person, presents evidence to the licensing authority linking specific premises with harms to children (such as ambulance data or emergency department attendances by persons under 18 year old with alcohol-related illness or injuries) this evidence should be considered, and the licensing authority should also consider what actin is appropriate to ensure this licensing objective is effectively enforced. In relation to applications for the grant of a licence in areas where evidence is presented on high levels of alcohol-related harms in persons aged under 18, it is recommended that the licensing authority considers what conditions may be appropriate to ensure that this objective is promoted effectively.

Offences relating to the sale and supply of alcohol to children

2.32 Licensing authorities are expected to maintain close contact with the police, young offenders' teams and trading standards officers (who can carry out test purchases under section 154 of the 2003 Act) about the extent of unlawful sales and consumption of alcohol by minors and to be involved in the development of any strategies to control or prevent these unlawful activities and to pursue prosecutions. Licensing authorities, alongside the police, are prosecuting authorities for the purposes of these offences, except for the offences under section 147A (persistently selling alcohol to children). Where, as a matter of policy, warnings are given to retailers prior to any decision to prosecute in respect of an offence, it is important that each of the enforcement arms should be aware of the warnings each of them has given.

The following relevant section of RBWM Licensing Policy (2016 – 2021):-

9. Promoting the Prevention of Public Nuisance

Where relevant representations are made, the Licensing Authority will have particular regard to the following issues in relation to the public nuisance objective:

- The disposal of waste, particularly glass
- The use and maintenance of plant, including air extraction and ventilation systems
- Litter in the vicinity of the premises
- Noise from deliveries / collections to and from the premises
- Measures to control behaviour and gueues
- Whether door supervisors are able to stay at the entrance to encourage quiet departure
- The provision of Hackney Carriage / Private Hire services at the premises
- Signs on doors and on tables encouraging consideration to the neighbours

6. Key Strategies for 2016 - 2021

6.1 Framework Hours

The current staggered closing times of licensed premises, that has developed since 2005 in the Royal Borough, has helped to reduce the problems associated with large numbers of people leaving premises at the same time and reduced congestion at taxi ranks and fast food outlets. However, the later opening hours have brought increased levels of crime, disorder and nuisance. Responsible Authorities, local residents and local Councillors have reported many issues, including noise, anti-social behaviour and litter, which are having an adverse impact on their quality of life. In particular, there has been an increase in violent crime in Windsor town centre between the hours of 00:00 and 04:00.

Having considered the evidence of alcohol related crime, disorder and anti-social behaviour, the number of late night premises and, in particular, the social, practical and regulatory impacts on the morning after the night before, the Licensing Authority

has adopted a Framework Hours Policy. This Framework Hours Policy will apply to new and variation applications.

The Framework Hours are: Premises Type:	Commencement Hour for Licensable Activities No earlier than:	Terminal Hour for Licensable Activities No later than:
Off licence	• 09:00am	• 11:00pm
Restaurant	• 09:00am	• 01:00am
Pub/Bars/Night Clubs	• 10:00am	• 02:00am
 Takeaways 	• n/a	• 02:00am

Have greater freedom to operate outside framework hours. Such venues are predominantly seated. Examples include:

- Theatres
- Cinemas
- Qualifying Clubs

For the purpose of this policy, premises shall be considered as a restaurant or café if the sale of alcohol is made only to seated customers who are also dining and where this is a condition of the licence, or a condition volunteered in the Operating Schedule for the premises. Where such conditions have not been offered, the premises will be treated as a public house.

Framework Hours are intended to guide applicants on the Licensing Authority's expectations when preparing their Operating Schedule. However, if no relevant representations are received, the application will be granted by the Licensing Authority under delegated powers.

Any conditions setting out hours of premises refers, unless otherwise stated, to the hours during which licensable activities may take place pursuant to the Premises Licence or Club premises Certificate. The Licensing Authority expects the premises to close thirty minutes after the terminal hour for the latest licensable activity.

6.4 Wider Community Interest

The Licensing Authority considers that its licensing functions are exercised in the public interest, furthermore that the licensing authority is under a duty to take any steps with a view to the promotion of the licensing objectives in the interests of the wider community and not just those of the individual licence holder.

The Licensing Authority will have particular regard to those applications in close proximity to residential premises and the likely effect on the promotion of the licensing objectives in such circumstances. Subject to any relevant representations, the Licensing Authority will have particular regard to:

- The nature of the activities
- The character of the surrounding area

E) Observations.

The Sub Committee is obliged to determine this application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives which are:

- The prevention of crime and disorder;
- Public safety;
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm.

In making its decision, the Committee is also obliged to have regard to national guidance and the Council's own Licensing Policy. Of course, the Committee must have regard to all of the representations made and the evidence it hears.

The Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

- Grant the application as asked.
- Modify the conditions of the licence, by altering or omitting or adding to them.
- Reject the whole or part of the application.

a) General - all four licensing objectives (b, c, d and e) (please read guidance note 10)

Staff will be trained before making sales of alcohol in their responsibilities under the Licensing Act 2003. Training will be documented & made available to the Police & authorised officers of the council upon reasonable request.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

A CCTV system will be in operation at the premises and recorded images shall be retained for a period of 30 days. CCTV images will be provided to the police and other responsible authorities as soon as practicable and in any case within 48 hours of a request for such images, subject of the provisions of the DPA.

A register of refusals of alcohol will be maintained at the premises. The register shall be examined on a regular basis by the duty manager/ DPS and the date and time of each examination will be endorsed in the register. The register will be made available for inspection by the Police and other authorised officers of the council upon reasonable request.

c) Public safety

An incident register will be maintained at the premises and made available to the authorities on request.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

A notice will be on display asking that the customers leave the area quietly and respect the local residents.

All staff at the store will be trained in how to manage any person who they suspect may create a public nuisance in the area of the store. Such people will be asked to leave the area quietly (if safe to do so) an entry will be made in the incident register.

e) The protection of children from harm

The premises will adopt a 'Challenge 25' policy. This means that if a customer purchasing alcohol appears to be under the age of 25 they will be asked for proof of their age, to prove that they are 18 years or older.

Posters will be on display advising customers of the 'Challenge 25' policy.

The only forms of identification that will be accepted at the premises are a passport, UK photo-card driving licences, & cards bearing the 'PASS' hologram.








We are writing in connection with the above planning application. We have examined the plans and I know the site well. I wish to object strongly to the proposed Off-Licence and supermarket as this would cause the following issues.

- 1. **Crime and disorder** The proposed opening hours of the off-Licence from 6.00 am to 11.00 pm shows Lack of awareness of the local residents and lack of responsibility to the community. With the potential increase in crime with the additional availability of Alcohol until late at night will also cause an interrupted sleep of local residents.
- 2. The prevention of public nuisance The availability of alcohol to purchase for longer hours would potentially encourage youngsters to hang around on the benches nearby the area until late and misbehave in an anti-social behaviour.

Thank you for speaking to me this morning as discussed I have written the objections to the application for Off-Licence for you to forward to Royal Borough Windsor and Maidenhead

licensing council along with other objection letters.

I am writing in connection to the Alcohol licence application no: 200140 for 113-117 Springfield Road, Windsor, SL4 3PZ.

To start with let me provide you a background to us;

- 1. As I mentioned to you, we have a shop that is next door to the proposed shop that has applied for the Alcohol licence.
- 2. We have been running this business for 15 years and over that period we built a close relationship with the local residents and have got to know them well and we have seen their young children grow up over the years.
- 3. We have gone out of our way to prevent crime and disorder and made sure we close the shop early so that neighbours are not disturbed late at night as the business is in residential area.
- 4. We know the children that come into the shop as we know the parents and make sure, they are not able to obtain alcohol and tobacco and are not loitering with the aim of obtaining the aforesaid.

To summarise the reasons why alcohol licence should not be allowed to the proposed applicant:

- 1. There is no requirement for another shop with an alcohol licence on a parade of just three commercial properties. If would be far more beneficial to provide diversity of another trade that the local residents and next-door school can benefit from.
- The hours requested for the alcohol licence (from 6.00 am to 11.00 pm) clearly shows a lack of awareness of the local area and lack of responsibility for the neighbours' welfare.
- 3. There is school in very close proximity to the shops. It would not provide any benefit (in fact it would be to the detriment of the local area) to have another shop selling alcohol and tobacco and more energy drinks. This is an area where the local residents are concerned and we have worked hard to keep the local youngsters away from.
- 4 Due to the proposed early and late opening times the youngsters will be able to get late night alcohol and sit on the nearby benches disturbing the neighbours and leading to an increase in anti-social behaviour.
- 5. The increase in traffic due to delivery lorries will not only cause parking problems but would also present a hazard to local children as well as children from the nearby school.
- 6. The proposed business is a family run business, with very little staff to take care of residents' welfare.

Having discussed the matter with a number of local residents there is a clear worry about this new business hoping to trade alcohol for the reasons outlined. As a consequence, we strongly object to the granting of any licence.

I would be grateful, if the concerns of our customers and local residents are taken into consideration as regards to the proposed application for the alcohol licence. We believe every effort should be made to stop the granting of the licence and preserve the safety, and peacefulness of the local community.

The Council also, apparently, takes into consideration the 'character' of the surrounding area, litter in the vicinity of the premises, and the 'crime/disorder nuisance potential'. Taking all these points, the first thing that springs to mind is the proximity of the premises to the back entrance to the local junior school.

We already have a convenience store in situ, next door to the subject premises at no. 109. They, no doubt, have their own premises certificate enabling the sale of excisable commodities such as alcohol and tobacco. Thus, do we need a second, somewhat larger 'convenience' store in direct competition next door?

Notwithstanding the distinct possibility of a price war between the two establishments, one can foresee a less than amicable relationship between the two!

It should also be noted that No. 109 has been targeted TWICE by burglars, just for the excisable commodities.

The character of the surrounding area is residential, involving both the 'private' and 'social' housing communities. This area has a steady 'traffic' of youngsters,

both 'children' and 'young adults' moving through the Springfield Road/York Road area, en route to either the town centre or the 'skate park', just beyond the underpass. The Council will be well aware of the vandal element in our area, given the number of times the underpass wall is repainted!! Drinks, both canned and bottled are purchased locally(whether or not alcoholic) and, once consumed, the can/bottle is tossed into any adjacent front garden, into the road, etc. etc. If it is a glass container, potentially dangerous broken glass is scattered around, all too predictably. Litter is already a growing menace in this locality.

Just have a look regularly, at the cul-de-sac end of York Road! This application by Costcutter (through their agents) can only exacerbate this problem.

Given that this is a residential area, the proposed 'operating hours' will mean that there will be a certain amount of 'light pollution' adding to that emitted by the new style street lighting. Once the premises are fitted out, no doubt including white light L.E.D.'s and/or fluorescent lights, this will give a problem to residences opposite, some of which may well include children trying to sleep!

We trust that due consideration will be given to this epistle, when the merits-or otherwise- are considered by the Council.
